G.1. CITY COUNCIL REPORTS ON REGIONAL ACTIVITIES

(Informational Oral Presentation - not for Council action)

Mayor Gutierrez opened the agenda item for public comments; there being none, public comments were closed.

March Joint Powers Commission (JPC)

Mayor Pro Tem Giba provided an update from the March Joint Powers Commission meeting on March 2nd.

The Joint Powers Commission reviewed and approved the March JPA's Cannabis Ordinance to mirror the County of Riverside's Ordinance.

We conducted a public hearing and vacated 5th Street VA building, and we approved a Temporary Construction Easement Agreement, both in support of the U.S. Vets Transitional Housing project.

I'm reminding everyone again that the March Air Fest is returning on April 16th and 17th. The full Schedule of Events is available on the March Air Force Base website, but I can share some highlights, including: Parachute and Formation Airplane teams, a Jet Car, Robosaurus, and the US Air Force Thunderbirds!

This event is always a lot of fun for the community.

Riverside County Habitat Conservation Agency (RCHCA)

None

Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC)

Mayor Gutierrez reported that at the March 9 meeting, the Board approved: A contract with Pepe's Towing to perform Freeway Service Patrol to help relieve freeway congestion and facilitate the rapid removal of disabled vehicles; Updated Goals and Objectives for the FY 16/17 budget, which include promoting mobility, encouraging economic development, supporting accessibility to many transportation services, improving system efficiency, and mitigating the impacts of goods movement; An agreement for a consultant to provide right of way services for the Mid County Parkway project

In addition, RCTC staff presented recommendations to address budget shortfalls in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The California Transportation Commission (CTC) requested Riverside County to reduce their funding by \$32 million. The Board approved reducing this amount in the French Valley Parkway interchange project. By reducing the funding in this project, it allowed the SR-60 Truck Climbing Lanes project, which is in the current STIP to remain unchanged.

Riverside Transit Agency (RTA)

Council Member Molina reported: at the March 2nd Administration and Operations Committee meeting, the Board approved providing a permanent memorial for City of Beaumont Council Member Jeff Fox who passed away on December 15, 2015. Mr. Fox served on the RTA Board of Directors from 2000 to 2013. The City of Beaumont will dedicate a bus stop honoring Mr. Fox and RTA will be installing a bronze plaque.

In addition, RTA has been upgrading their fleet of small and large fixed-route buses to include free Wi-Fi. The project began in January and will be complete in the fall. In all, more than 200 buses will have this free service. As each bus is upgraded, a Wi-Fi logo is added to the outside of the bus, to make riders aware

that the service is available.

The technology is part of RTA's Intelligent Transportation project, that includes a text-alert system to receive up-to-the minute arrival times and a new app that allows riders to monitor real-time bus locations. Those technology upgrades will be coming soon.

Western Riverside Council of Governments (WRCOG)

Mayor Pro Tem Giba reported that the following is a brief update of items covered at the WRCOG Executive Committee meeting on March 7, 2016.

HERO Program

The HERO program continues to be active and now includes approximately 300 cities and counties. The Cities of Dos Palos, Gustine, King City, Sacramento and Santa Clara, the Towns of Atherton and Coloma and the County of San Joaquin unincorporated areas were added to the Hero Program. The City of Moreno Valley from the Hero program, cost offset did receive \$153,000 for some of the programs here.

Beyond Framework Fund Program

The Beyond Program was approved by WRCOG's Executive Committee in 2012. The premise of the Framework is quality of life. Some of the major contributing factors to the Program include education, water quality and supply, health, transportation, energy, and environment.

In Round 1 of Program fund allocations, the City of Moreno Valley was allocated \$153,294. The City is dividing funds between 12 initiatives including the installation of a water station at the Juan Bautista Trailhead, materials and supplies for three Safe Routes to School events, replacement of 38 computers at the employment resource center, and bicycle rack installation at various properties along Alessandro Boulevard between the Old 215 and Perris Boulevard.

South Coast Air Quality Management District Activities Update

AQMD staff is proposing to extend the Lawn Mower Exchange Program into the fall of 2016. Since the inception of the program, over 55,000 gasoline powered mowers have been exchanged for zero-emission battery-electric lawn mowers.

AQMD District staff is developing additional incentive programs for Riverside County including reimbursements for costs of Commercial Cordless handheld landscape equipment, and reimbursement of Plug-In Electric (PEV) charges. Both programs are expected to be available to government agencies and non-profit organizations.

Additionally, there was some support from WRCOG on AB 1713. We do not look forward to that one. Director was to sign a coalition letter on behalf of WRCOG indicating its opposition to AB 1713, which would prohibit the construction of peripheral canal.

There have been some updates and changes to the revised CEQUA guidelines

proposal, which is SB 743. WRCOG held a separate meeting regarding this issue. A document regarding new guidelines for the proposal is available for public's review.

Western Riverside County Regional Conservation Authority (RCA)

Council Member Jempson provided a brief update of items covered at the RCA Board meeting on March 7, 2016.

A financial report was presented to Board members for the period from July 1, 2015 through the end of the calendar year. On a positive note, based on the report findings, it was noted that revenue from development mitigation fees has exceeded the budgeted revenue since July 1 of last year. Therefore, the projections for revenue for the current fiscal year were increased by \$1,500,000 to a total budget of \$10,800,000. This increase in development mitigation fee activity suggests improving development and economic conditions for the County and the member cities.

The Board also considered the annual review of the mitigation fee rate. Based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI) trend, the Board approved an increase CPI adjustment of 2.03%. The fee increase will take effect on July 1. The Agency will be forwarding a letter to City staff requesting that the City staff bring the CPI adjustment forward to City Council for action prior to July 1.

School District/City Joint Task Force

Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG)

Mayor Pro Tem Giba stated that SCAG meetings are held on the first Thursday of each month and reported on SCAG meeting held on March 3: Continued discussion and input to the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) update. On March 24, they will be finalizing comments from SCAG's personnel - an opportunity for residents to comment on RTP. On April 7, it will be the beginning of the voting for approval of the draft to finalize the Regional Transportation Plan. WRCOG, Nexis and regional studies are dependent upon SCAG's RTP in order for them to go forward on some of the decisions. On May 5 and 6, a General Assembly Regional Conference will be held. Invited residents to attend.

Box Springs Mutual Water District (BSMWD)

Council Member Jempson reported regarding the Box Springs Mutual Waster District - unfortunately there was no quorum of the Board of Directors because two of the board members were out of town. Stated it was a good opportunity for her to speak to Mr. Marks and residents. Regarding the Sherman improvement project (the City is ready to move on that), the Box Springs District has done a portion of the work that they committed to, and we are going back to the table tomorrow to discuss and clarify a couple of items so we can get the project finished. Improvement continues in the Edgemont area.

G.2. SIGNATURE AUTHORITY OF CITY MANAGER (Report of: Financial & Management Services)

Mayor Gutierrez opened the agenda item for public comments, which were received from Evan Morgan, Tom Jerele Sr, and Robert Harris.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

- 1. Approve the Cooperative Agreement with the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District (the District), the City of Moreno Valley, and Prologis USLV TRS CASUB, LLC for the Sunnymead Brodiaea Avenue Storm Drain facility, Stage 2.
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute the Cooperative Agreement.
- 3. Direct the City Clerk to forward the signed Cooperative Agreement to the District.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of the Cooperative Agreement between the District, the City, and Prologis to allow for the construction of storm drain facilities. As a condition of approval of projects Tentative Parcel Map (TPM) 36465 (PA13-0011) and PA12-0021 (plot plan), the City requires the developer to construct certain public improvements in order to provide flood protection and drainage as a result of the developer's planned development. The Cooperative Agreement is the District's mechanism by which the District, the City, and the developer coordinate the construction and maintenance of master storm drain facilities. The required facility for

this project includes the relocation of an existing storm drain facility on the proposed project site. The construction will consist of approximately 1,052 lineal feet of a new underground storm drain system located along the project's westerly boundary and the abandonment of existing storm drain located where a proposed warehouse facility will be constructed. Once constructed, inspected and accepted, the new storm drain will be maintained on an interim basis by the City.

DISCUSSION

The City Council approved plot plan PA12-0021 on December 11, 2012 for the construction of an approximately 608,000 square-foot warehouse facility. Subsequent to the plot plan approval, the Community Development Department of the City of Moreno Valley approved TPM 36465 (PA13-0011) on September 5, 2013. TPM 36465 is a subdivision combining three (3) parcels into one (1) parcel in order to construct the proposed warehouse facility on a single parcel. The developer proposes to construct a warehouse facility where an existing storm drain line crosses the project site. This will require the relocation of the storm drain facility towards the westerly project boundary. The project site is located at the northwest corner of Graham Street and Brodiaea Avenue.

The Developer will be responsible for the design and construction of the storm drain improvements. The Developer will prepare plans and specifications in accordance with the District's and the City's standards and submit improvement plans to the District and the City for review and approval. The City is willing to review the plans and specifications, provide inspection for the construction, and accept interim ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the City's drainage facilities, if the developer meets all requirements of the agreement. The District is willing to review the plans and specifications, provide inspection for the construction, and accept ultimate ownership and responsibility for the maintenance of the District's drainage facilities, if the developer meets all requirements of the agreement. The City will also consent to hold a Faithful Performance bond and Material and Labor bond for both the District's Drainage Facility and the City's Drainage Facility.

The City will maintain the storm drain facility on an interim basis until such time that the Sunnymead – Brodiaea Avenue, Stage 3 master drainage plan (MDP) storm drain facility is constructed. Once Stage 3 is constructed, inspected and accepted by the District, the District will ultimately maintain Stage 2 of the MDP storm drain facility. The improvements were bonded by the Developer and have been submitted to City Council for approval as part of the parcel map approval and Agreement for Public Improvements for PA13-0011 (PM 36465) scheduled for City Council approval on April 19, 2016. The storm drain portion of the bonds will be held by the City until completion of the storm drain and acceptance of the storm drain improvements by the City and City Council.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff recommends this alternative as it will allow the project to construct master drainage plan storm drain facilities.
- 2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff does not recommend this alternative as it will not allow the project to construct master drainage plan storm drain facilities.

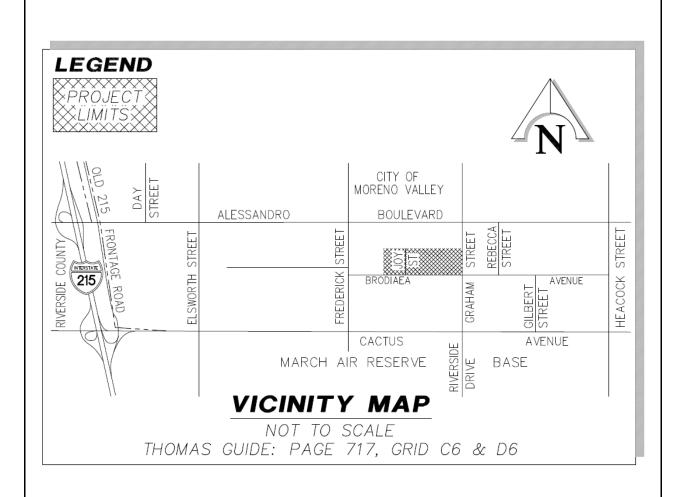

The Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District, hereinafter called "DISTRICT", the City of Moreno Valley, hereinafter called "CITY", and Prologis USLV TRS CASUB, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company, hereinafter called "DEVELOPER", hereby agree as follows:

RECITALS

- A. DISTRICT owns, operates and maintains the Sunnymead Brodiaea Avenue Storm Drain facility (Drawing No. 4-0888), an underground storm drain system, hereinafter called "DISTRICT FACILITY"; and
- B. Located in the city of Moreno Valley, DISTRICT FACILITY is an essential and integral part of DISTRICT'S flood and stormwater management infrastructure and provides critical flood protection for nearby homes and businesses; and
- C. In conjunction with the original construction of DISTRICT FACILITY, DISTRICT acquired certain rights of way, hereinafter called "DISTRICT EASEMENTS", as recorded in the Official Records of Riverside County as Document No. 2011-0109844; and
- D. In conjunction with the planned expansion of its warehousing facilities, DEVELOPER has submitted for approval Parcel Map No. 36465 and as a condition of approval for Parcel Map No. 36465, DEVELOPER proposes to realign and construct a new reach consisting of approximately 1,052 lineal feet of underground storm drain system, hereinafter called "STORM DRAIN", as shown in red on Exhibit "A", attached hereto and made a part hereof, in order to restore drainage function. Also associated with the construction of STORM DRAIN is the construction of certain catch basins, outlets, inlets, connector pipes, and various lateral storm drains that are thirty-six inches (36") or less in diameter that are to be located within public and privately held easements or rights of way, hereinafter collectively called "DEVELOPER FACILITIES". DEVELOPER FACILITIES are to be initially owned and maintained by DEVELOPER, and subsequently owned and maintained by the private property owner for Parcel Map No. 36465; and
- H. Together, STORM DRAIN, APPURTENANCES and DEVELOPER FACILITIES are hereinafter called "PROJECT"; and
- I. All parties recognize and acknowledge that STORM DRAIN will not be accepted for ownership, operation and maintenance responsibilities by DISTRICT until the proposed Sunnymead Brodiaea Avenue Storm Drain, Stage 3, to be constructed by others, hereinafter called "PROPOSED STAGE 3" is completed and accepted by DISTRICT; and
- J. CITY is willing to assume ownership, operation and maintenance responsibilities of STORM DRAIN on an interim basis as set forth herein, with the recognition and understanding that the actual acceptance of STORM DRAIN for ownership, operation and maintenance responsibilities by DISTRICT is entirely dependent upon: (i) the construction of PROPOSED STAGE 3 being complete; (ii) DISTRICT acceptance of ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of PROPOSED STAGE 3; (iii) STORM DRAIN

being constructed in accordance with plans and specifications approved by DISTRICT and CITY and as set forth herein; (iv) DISTRICT'S sole determination that STORM DRAIN is in a satisfactorily maintained condition, and (v) STORM DRAIN is fully functioning as a flood control drainage system as solely determined by DISTRICT; and

- K. DEVELOPER and CITY desire DISTRICT to ultimately accept ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN, and (ii) interim operation and maintenance responsibilities of the existing facility as shown on DISTRICT Drawing No. 4-0888. Therefore, DISTRICT must review and approve DEVELOPER'S plans and specifications for PROJECT and subsequently inspect the construction of STORM DRAIN; and
- L. DEVELOPER and DISTRICT desire CITY to accept ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of APPURTENANCES. Additionally, it is mutually understood and agreed that CITY shall assume ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN until such time as DISTRICT accepts ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN as set forth herein. Therefore, CITY must review and approve DEVELOPER'S plans and specifications for PROJECT and subsequently inspect the construction of PROJECT; and
- M. DISTRICT is willing to (i) review and approve DEVELOPER'S plans and specifications for PROJECT, (ii) inspect the construction of STORM DRAIN, (iii) ultimately assume ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN, and (iv) accept interim responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the existing facility pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, provided DEVELOPER (a) complies with this Agreement, (b) constructs PROJECT in accordance with DISTRICT and CITY approved plans and specifications, (c) obtains and conveys to CITY all rights of way necessary for the inspection, operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN as set forth herein, and (d) accepts ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of PROJECT following completion of PROJECT

construction until such time as DISTRICT accepts ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN; and

N. CITY is willing to (i) review and approve DEVELOPER'S plans and specifications for PROJECT, (ii) inspect the construction of PROJECT, (iii) accept and hold faithful performance and payment bonds submitted by DEVELOPER for STORM DRAIN, (iv) grant DISTRICT the right to inspect, operate and maintain STORM DRAIN within CITY rights of way, (v) assume ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of APPURTENANCES upon completion of PROJECT construction, and (vi) assume ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN following completion of PROJECT construction until such time as DISTRICT accepts ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN as set forth herein, provided PROJECT is constructed in accordance with plans and specifications approved by DISTRICT and CITY; and

O. DISTRICT is willing, upon recordation of the final map for Parcel Map No. 36465, vacate a portion of the existing DISTRICT EASEMENTS as shown in concept cross-hatched in green on Exhibit "C" attached hereto and made a part hereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto mutually agree as follows:

SECTION I

DEVELOPER shall:

- Prepare PROJECT plans and specifications, hereinafter called "IMPROVEMENT PLANS", in accordance with applicable DISTRICT and CITY standards, and submit to DISTRICT and CITY for their respective review and approval.
- 2. Continue to pay DISTRICT, within thirty (30) days after receipt of periodic billings from DISTRICT, any and all such amounts as are deemed reasonably necessary by DISTRICT to cover DISTRICT'S costs associated with the review of IMPROVEMENT PLANS, review and approval of rights of way and conveyance documents, and with the processing and

administration of this Cooperative Agreement. Additionally, DEVELOPER shall deposit with CITY, any and all such amounts as are deemed reasonably necessary by CITY to cover CITY'S costs associated with the review of IMPROVEMENT PLANS, the review and approval of all right of way and conveyance documents, and with the processing and administration of this Agreement.

- 3. Deposit with DISTRICT (Attention: Business Office Accounts Receivable), at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of PROJECT construction as set forth in Section I.8. herein, the estimated cost of providing construction inspection for STORM DRAIN, in an amount as determined and approved by DISTRICT in accordance with Ordinance Nos. 671 and 749 of the County of Riverside, including any amendments thereto, based upon the bonded value of STORM DRAIN. If at any time the costs exceed the deposit or are anticipated by DISTRICT to exceed the deposit with DISTRICT, DEVELOPER shall pay such additional amount(s), as deemed reasonably necessary by DISTRICT to complete inspection of STORM DRAIN, within thirty (30) days after receipt of billing from DISTRICT. Additionally, deposit with CITY (Attention: Public Works/Land Development), at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of PROJECT construction as set forth in Section I.8., the estimated cost of providing construction inspection in an amount as determined and approved by CITY in accordance with the most recent City Code and Fee Resolution of CITY, including any amendments thereto.
- 4. Secure, at its sole cost and expense, all necessary licenses, agreements, permits and rights of entry as may be needed for the construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN. DEVELOPER shall furnish DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.8., or not less than twenty (20) days prior to recordation of the final map for Parcel Map No. 36465 or any phase thereof, whichever occurs first, with sufficient evidence of DEVELOPER having

5. Furnish DISTRICT and CITY with copies of all permits, approvals or agreements required by any federal, state or local resource and/or regulatory agency for the construction, operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN. Such documents include, but are not limited to, those issued by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, California Regional Water Quality Control Board, California State Department of Fish and Wildlife, State Water Resources

secured such necessary licenses, agreements, permits and rights of entry, as determined and

6. Grant DISTRICT and CITY, by execution of this Agreement, the right to enter upon DEVELOPER'S property where necessary and convenient for the purpose of gaining access to and performing inspection service for the construction of PROJECT as set forth herein.

Control Board, and Western Riverside County Regional Conservation Authority.

- 7. Provide CITY, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.8. or not less than twenty (20) days prior to recordation of the final map for Parcel Map No. 36465 or any phase thereof, whichever occurs first, with faithful performance and payment bonds, each in the amount of one hundred percent (100%) of the estimated cost for construction of STORM DRAIN as determined by DISTRICT. The surety, amount and form of the bonds, shall be subject to approval of DISTRICT and CITY. The bonds shall remain in full force and effect until STORM DRAIN is accepted by DISTRICT as complete; at which time the bond amount may be reduced to five percent (5%) for a period of one (1) year to guarantee against any defective work, labor or materials.
- 8. Notify DISTRICT in writing (Attention: Administrative Services Section) and CITY at least twenty (20) days prior to the start of construction of PROJECT. Construction shall not begin on any element of PROJECT, for any reason whatsoever, until DISTRICT has issued to DEVELOPER a written Notice to Proceed authorizing DEVELOPER to commence construction of PROJECT.

- 9. Obtain and provide DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction of PROJECT as set forth in Section I.8. or not less than twenty (20) days prior to the recordation of the final map for Parcel Map No. 36465 or any phase thereof, whichever occurs first, with duly executed Irrevocable Offers(s) of Dedication to the public for flood control and drainage purposes, including ingress and egress, for the rights of way deemed necessary by DISTRICT for the construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN. The Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication shall be in a form approved by DISTRICT and shall be executed by all legal and equitable owners of the property described in the offer(s).
- 10. Furnish DISTRICT, when submitting the Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication as set forth in Section I.9., with Preliminary Reports on Title dated not more than thirty (30) days prior to date of submission of all the property described in the Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication.
- 11. Furnish DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.8., with a complete list of all contractors and subcontractors to be performing work on STORM DRAIN, including the corresponding license number and license classification of each. At such time, DEVELOPER shall further identify in writing its designated superintendent for PROJECT construction.
- 12. Furnish DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.8., a construction schedule which shall show the order and dates in which DEVELOPER or DEVELOPER'S contractor proposes to carry out the various parts of work, including estimated start and completion dates. As construction of STORM DRAIN progresses, DEVELOPER shall update said construction schedule as requested by DISTRICT.

- 14. Not permit any change to or modification of DISTRICT and CITY approved IMPROVEMENT PLANS without the prior written permission and consent of DISTRICT and CITY.
- 15. Comply with all Cal/OSHA safety regulations including regulations concerning confined space and maintain a safe working environment for DEVELOPER, CITY and DISTRICT employees on the site.
- 16. Furnish DISTRICT, at the time of providing written notice to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.8., a confined space entry procedure specific to PROJECT. The procedure shall comply with requirements contained in California Code of Regulations, Title 8, Section 5158, Other Confined Space Operations, Section 5157, Permit Required Confined Space and District Confined Space Procedures, SOM-18. The procedure shall be reviewed and approved by DISTRICT prior to the issuance of a Notice to Proceed.
- 17. DEVELOPER shall not commence operations until DISTRICT has been furnished with original certificate(s) of insurance and original certified copies of endorsements and if requested, certified original policies of insurance including all endorsements and any and all other attachments as required in this Section.

Without limiting or diminishing DEVELOPER'S obligation to indemnify or hold DISTRICT harmless, DEVELOPER shall procure and maintain or cause to be maintained, at its sole cost and expense, the following insurance coverage's during the term of this Agreement:

A. Workers' Compensation:

If DEVELOPER has employees as defined by the State of California, DEVELOPER shall maintain statutory Workers' Compensation Insurance

(Coverage A) as prescribed by the laws of the State of California. Policy shall include Employers' Liability (Coverage B) including Occupational Disease with limits not less than \$1,000,000 per person per accident. Policy shall be endorsed to waive subrogation in favor of DISTRICT, the County of Riverside and CITY, and, if applicable, to provide a Borrowed Servant/Alternate Employer Endorsement.

B. <u>Commercial General Liability</u>:

Commercial General Liability insurance coverage, including but not limited to, premises liability, unmodified contractual liability, products and completed operations liability, personal and advertising injury, and cross liability coverage, covering claims which may arise from or out of DEVELOPER'S performance of its obligations hereunder. Policy shall name the DISTRICT, the County of Riverside and CITY, its agencies, districts, special districts, and departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, employees, elected or appointed officials, agents or representatives as additional insureds. Policy's limit of liability shall not be less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence combined single limit. If such insurance contains a general aggregate limit, it shall apply separately to this Agreement or be no less than two (2) times the occurrence limit.

C. <u>Vehicle Liability</u>:

If DEVELOPER'S vehicles or mobile equipment are used in the performance of the obligations under this Agreement, then DEVELOPER shall maintain liability insurance for all owned, non-owned or hired vehicles so used in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence combined single limit. If such insurance contains a general aggregate limit, it shall apply separately to

this Agreement or be no less than two (2) times the occurrence limit. Policy shall name the DISTRICT, the County of Riverside and CITY, its agencies, districts, special districts, and departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, employees, elected or appointed officials, agents or representatives as additional insureds.

D. <u>Professional Liability</u>:

DEVELOPER shall maintain Professional Liability Insurance providing coverage for DEVELOPER'S performance of work included within this Agreement, with a limit of liability of not less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence and \$4,000,000 annual aggregate. If DEVELOPER'S Professional Liability Insurance is written on a claims made basis rather than an occurrence basis, such insurance shall continue through the term of this Agreement and DEVELOPER shall purchase at his sole expense either 1) an Extended Reporting Endorsement (also known as Tail Coverage); or 2) Prior Dates Coverage from a new insurer with a retroactive date back to the date of, or prior to, the inception of this Agreement; or 3) demonstrate through Certificates of Insurance that DEVELOPER has maintained continuous coverage with the same or original insurer. Coverage provided under items: 1), 2) or 3) will continue as long as the law allows.

E. General Insurance Provisions – All Lines:

i. Any insurance carrier providing insurance coverage hereunder shall be admitted to the State of California and have an A.M. BEST rating of not less than an A: VIII (A: 8) unless such requirements are waived, in writing, by the County and CITY Risk Managers. If the Risk Managers

waive a requirement for a particular insurer such waiver is only valid for that specific insurer and only for one policy term.

- ii. The DEVELOPER must declare its insurance self-insured retention for each coverage required herein. If any such self-insured retention exceeds \$500,000 per occurrence each such retention shall have the prior written consent of the County and CITY Risk Managers before the commencement of operations under this Agreement. Upon notification of self-insured retention deemed unacceptable to the DISTRICT, and at the election of the Risk Managers, DEVELOPER'S carriers shall either:

 1) reduce or eliminate such self-insured retention with respect to this Agreement with DISTRICT, or 2) procure a bond which guarantees payment of losses and related investigations, claims administration, and defense costs and expenses.
- DEVELOPER shall cause their insurance carrier(s) to furnish DISTRICT with 1) a properly executed original certificate(s) of insurance and certified original copies of endorsements effecting coverage as required herein; and 2) if requested to do so orally or in writing by the County and CITY Risk Managers, provide original certified copies of policies including all endorsements and all attachments thereto, showing such insurance is in full force and effect. Further, said certificate(s) and policies of insurance shall contain the covenant of the insurance carrier(s) that a minimum of sixty (60) days written notice shall be given to the DISTRICT prior to any material modification, cancellation, expiration or reduction in coverage of such insurance. If DEVELOPER insurance carrier(s) policies does not meet

the minimum notice requirement found herein, DEVELOPER shall cause DEVELOPER'S insurance carrier(s) to furnish a 60 day Notice of Cancellation Endorsement. In the event of a material modification, cancellation, expiration or reduction in coverage, this Agreement shall terminate forthwith, unless DISTRICT receives, prior to such effective date, another properly executed original certificate of insurance and original copies of endorsements or certified original policies, including all endorsements and attachments thereto, evidencing coverages set forth herein and the insurance required herein is in full force and effect. An individual authorized by the insurance carrier to do so on its behalf shall sign the original endorsements for each policy and the certificate of insurance.

- iv. It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto that DEVELOPER'S insurance shall be construed as primary insurance, and DISTRICT'S and CITY'S insurance and/or deductibles and/or self-insured retentions or self-insured programs shall not be construed as contributory.
 - If, during the term of this Agreement or any extension thereof, there is a material change in the scope of services or there is a material change in the equipment to be used in the performance of the scope of work which will add additional exposures (such as the use of aircraft, watercraft, cranes, etc.); or the term of this Agreement, including any extensions thereof, exceeds five (5) years, DISTRICT and CITY reserve the right to adjust the types of insurance required under this Agreement and the monetary limits of liability for the insurance coverages currently required herein, if, in the County or CITY Risk Manager's reasonable

- vi. DEVELOPER shall pass down the insurance obligations contained herein to all tiers of subcontractors working under this Agreement.
- vii. The insurance requirements contained in this Agreement may be met with a program(s) of self-insurance acceptable to DISTRICT and CITY.
- viii. DEVELOPER agrees to notify DISTRICT and CITY of any claim by a third party or any incident or event that may give rise to a claim arising from the performance of this Agreement.

Failure to maintain the insurance required by this paragraph shall be deemed a material breach of this Agreement and shall authorize and constitute authority for DISTRICT, at its sole discretion, to provide written notice to DEVELOPER that DISTRICT is unable to perform its obligations hereunder, nor to accept responsibility for ownership, operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN due, either in whole or in part, to said breach of this Agreement.

- 18. Construct or cause to be constructed, PROJECT at DEVELOPER'S sole cost and expense, in accordance with DISTRICT and CITY approved IMPROVEMENT PLANS.
- 19. Within two (2) weeks of completing PROJECT construction, provide DISTRICT (Attention: Development Review Section) and CITY with written notice that PROJECT construction is substantially complete and requesting that DISTRICT conduct a final inspection of STORM DRAIN and CITY conduct a final inspection of PROJECT. It is mutually understood that, prior to DISTRICT acceptance of ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN, STORM DRAIN shall be in a satisfactorily maintained condition as solely determined by DISTRICT and construction of PROPOSED STAGE 3 shall be complete.

20. Upon completion of PROJECT construction, and upon acceptance by CTT Y
of all rights of way deemed necessary by DISTRICT and CITY for the operation and maintenance
of PROJECT, but prior to CITY acceptance of STORM DRAIN for ownership, operation and
maintenance, convey, or cause to be conveyed to CITY (i) the flood control easement(s) including
ingress and egress, to the rights of way as shown in concept in blue on Exhibit "D" attached hereto
and made a part hereof. The easement(s) or grant deed(s) shall be in a form approved by both
DISTRICT and CITY and shall be executed by all legal and equitable owners of the property
described in the easement(s) or grant deed(s).

- 21. At the time of recordation of the conveyance document(s) as set forth in Section I.20., furnish CITY with policies of title insurance, each in the amount of not less than (i) fifty percent (50%) of the estimated fee value, as determined by DISTRICT and CITY, for each easement parcel to be conveyed to CITY, or (ii) one hundred percent (100%) of the estimated value, as determined by DISTRICT and CITY, for each fee parcel to be conveyed to CITY, guaranteeing CITY'S interest in said property as being free and clear of all liens, encumbrances, assessments, easements, taxes and leases (recorded or unrecorded), and except those which, in the sole discretion of DISTRICT and CITY, are acceptable.
- 22. Accept ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of PROJECT until such time as: (i) DISTRICT'S acceptance of STORM DRAIN construction as being complete, (ii) CITY accepts ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN, (iii) CITY accepts ownership and responsibility for operation and maintenance of APPURTENANCES, and (iv) the private property owner for Parcel Map No. 36465 accepts ownership and responsibility for operation and maintenance of DEVELOPER FACILITIES.

- 25. Upon completion of PROJECT construction, but prior to CITY acceptance of STORM DRAIN for ownership, operation and maintenance, provide or cause its civil engineer of record or construction civil engineer of record, duly registered in the State of California, to provide DISTRICT with a redlined "record drawings" copy of PROJECT plans. After DISTRICT approval of the redlined "record drawings", DEVELOPER'S engineer shall schedule with DISTRICT a time to transfer the redlined changes onto DISTRICT'S original mylars at DISTRICT'S office, after which the engineer shall review, stamp and sign the original PROJECT engineering plans "record drawings".
- 26. Ensure that all work performed pursuant to this Cooperative Agreement by DEVELOPER, its agents or contractors is done in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations, including but not limited to all applicable provisions of the Labor Code, Business and Professions Code, and Water Code. DEVELOPER shall be solely responsible for all costs associated with compliance with applicable laws and regulations.

- 4. Consent, by execution of this Cooperative Agreement, to the recording of any Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication furnished by DEVELOPER pursuant to this Cooperative Agreement.
- 5. As requested by DISTRICT, accept the Irrevocable Offer(s) of Dedication as set forth herein, and any other outstanding offers of dedication necessary for the construction, inspection, operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN, and, convey sufficient rights of way to DISTRICT to allow DISTRICT to construct, inspect, operate and maintain STORM DRAIN.

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- 6. Grant DISTRICT, by execution of this Agreement, the right to inspect, operate and maintain STORM DRAIN within CITY rights of way.
- 7. Accept ownership and sole responsibility for the operation and maintenance of APPURTENANCES and STORM DRAIN upon (i) CITY inspection of PROJECT in accordance with Section I.20., (ii) CITY acceptance of PROJECT construction as being complete, (iii) DISTRICT acceptance of STORM DRAIN construction as being complete, and (iv) CITY receipt of stamped and signed "record drawings" of STORM DRAIN plans as set forth in Section II.8.
- Accept sole ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance 8. of STORM DRAIN until such time as (i) the construction of PROPOSED STAGE 3 is complete, and (ii) STORM DRAIN is formally accepted by DISTRICT for ownership, operation and maintenance. It is mutually understood that, prior to DISTRICT acceptance of ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN, STORM DRAIN shall be in a satisfactorily maintained condition as solely determined by DISTRICT. If, subsequent to the inspection and, in the sole discretion of DISTRICT, STORM DRAIN is not in an acceptable condition, corrections shall be made at CITY'S sole expense.
- Accept all liability whatsoever associated with the ownership, operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN until such time as STORM DRAIN is formally accepted by DISTRICT for ownership, operation and maintenance.
- Following CITY'S acceptance of STORM DRAIN for ownership, operation and maintenance, not permit any change to, or modification of, STORM DRAIN without the prior written permission and consent of DISTRICT.
- Upon construction completion of PROPOSED STAGE 3 but prior to DISTRICT acceptance of ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN, convey, or cause to be conveyed to DISTRICT the flood control easement(s),

by DISTRICT, for the rights of way as deemed necessary solely by the DISTRICT for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN.

9. Upon DISTRICT acceptance of STORM DRAIN construction as being complete, accept sole responsibility for the adjustment of all PROJECT manhole rings and covers located within CITY rights of way which must be performed at such time(s) that the finished grade along and above the underground portions of STORM DRAIN are improved, repaired, replaced or changed. It being further understood and agreed that any such adjustments shall be performed at no cost to DISTRICT.

SECTION IV

It is further mutually agreed:

- 1. Prior to CITY'S acceptance of ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN from DEVELOPER, STORM DRAIN shall be in a satisfactorily maintained condition as solely determined by DISTRICT. If, in the sole discretion of DISTRICT, STORM DRAIN is not in acceptable condition, corrections shall be at DEVELOPER'S sole expense. Following CITY'S acceptance of STORM DRAIN for ownership, operation and maintenance and prior to DISTRICT'S acceptance of ownership and responsibility for the operation and maintenance of STORM DRAIN, STORM DRAIN shall be in a satisfactorily maintained condition as solely determined by DISTRICT. If, in the sole discretion of DISTRICT, STORM DRAIN is not in acceptable condition, corrections shall be made at CITY'S sole expense.
- 2. All work involved with PROJECT shall be inspected by DISTRICT and CITY but shall not be deemed complete until DISTRICT and CITY mutually agree in writing that construction is completed in accordance with DISTRICT and CITY approved IMPROVEMENT PLANS.

3. CITY and DEVELOPER personnel may observe and inspect all work being done on STORM DRAIN, but shall provide any comments to DISTRICT personnel who shall be solely responsible for all quality control communications with DEVELOPER'S contractor(s) during the construction of PROJECT.

- 4. DEVELOPER shall complete construction of PROJECT within twelve (12) consecutive months after execution of this Cooperative Agreement and within one hundred twenty (120) consecutive calendar days after commencing work on PROJECT. It is expressly understood that since time is of the essence in this Cooperative Agreement, failure of DEVELOPER to perform the work within the agreed upon time shall constitute authority for DISTRICT to perform the remaining work and require DEVELOPER'S surety to pay to CITY the penal sum of any and all bonds. In which case, CITY shall subsequently reimburse DISTRICT for DISTRICT costs incurred.
- 5. If DEVELOPER fails to commence construction of PROJECT within nine (9) months after execution of this Cooperative Agreement, then DISTRICT reserves the right to withhold issuance of the Notice to Proceed pending a review of the existing site conditions as they exist at the time DEVELOPER provides written notification to DISTRICT of the start of construction as set forth in Section I.8. In the event of a change in the existing site conditions that materially affects PROJECT function or DISTRICT'S ability to operate and maintain STORM DRAIN, DISTRICT may require DEVELOPER to modify IMPROVEMENT PLANS as deemed necessary by DISTRICT.
- 6. DISTRICT shall endeavor to issue DEVELOPER a Notice to Proceed within twenty (20) days of receipt of DEVELOPER'S complete written notice as set forth in Section I.8.; however, DISTRICT'S construction inspection staff is limited and, therefore, the issuance of a Notice to Proceed is subject to staff availability.

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In the event DEVELOPER wishes to expedite issuance of a Notice to Proceed, DEVELOPER may elect to furnish an independent qualified construction inspector at DEVELOPER'S sole cost and expense. DEVELOPER shall furnish appropriate documentation of the individual's credentials and experience to DISTRICT for review and, if appropriate, approval. DISTRICT shall review the individual's qualifications and experience, and upon approval thereof, said individual, hereinafter called "DEPUTY INSPECTOR", shall be authorized to act on DISTRICT'S behalf on all STORM DRAIN construction and quality control matters. If DEVELOPER'S initial construction inspection deposit furnished pursuant to Section I.3. exceeds ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), DISTRICT shall refund to DEVELOPER up to eighty percent (80%) of DEVELOPER'S initial inspection deposit within forty-five (45) days of DISTRICT'S approval of DEPUTY INSPECTOR; however, a minimum balance of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) shall be retained on account.

7. PROJECT construction work shall be on a five (5) day, forty (40) hour work week with no work on Saturdays, Sundays or DISTRICT designated legal holidays, unless otherwise approved in writing by DISTRICT. If DEVELOPER feels it is necessary to work more than the normal forty (40) hour work week or on holidays, DEVELOPER shall make a written request for permission from DISTRICT to work the additional hours. The request shall be submitted to DISTRICT at least seventy-two (72) hours prior to the requested additional work hours and state the reasons for the overtime and the specific time frames required. The decision of granting permission for overtime work shall be made by DISTRICT at its sole discretion and shall be final. If permission is granted by DISTRICT, DEVELOPER will be charged the cost incurred at the overtime rates for additional inspection time required in connection with the overtime work in accordance with Ordinance Nos. 671 and 749, including any amendments thereto, of the County of Riverside.

(including their agencies, districts, special districts and departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives) from any liability, claim, damage, proceeding or action, present or future, based upon, arising out of or in any way relating to DEVELOPER'S (including its officers, employees, subcontractors and agents) actual or alleged acts or omissions related to this Agreement, performance under this Agreement, or failure to comply with the requirements of this Agreement, including but not limited to: (a) property damage; (b) bodily injury or death; (c) liability or damage pursuant to Article I, Section 19 of the California Constitution, the Fifth Amendment of the United States Constitution or any other law, ordinance or regulation caused by the diversion of waters from the natural drainage patterns or the discharge of drainage within or from PROJECT; or (d) any other element of any kind or nature whatsoever.

DEVELOPER shall defend, at its sole expense, including all costs and fees (including but not limited to attorney fees, cost of investigation, defense and settlements or awards), DISTRICT and CITY (including their agencies, districts, special districts and departments, their respective directors, officers, Board of Supervisors, elected and appointed officials, employees, agents and representatives) in any claim, proceeding or action for which indemnification is required.

With respect to any of DEVELOPER'S indemnification requirements, DEVELOPER shall, at its sole cost, have the right to use counsel of their own choice and shall have the right to adjust, settle, compromise any such claim, proceeding or action without the prior consent of DISTRICT and CITY; provided, however, that any such adjustment, settlement or compromise in no manner whatsoever limits or circumscribes DEVELOPER'S indemnification obligations to DISTRICT or CITY.

DEVELOPER'S indemnification obligations shall be satisfied when DEVELOPER has provided to DISTRICT and CITY the appropriate form of dismissal (or similar document) relieving DISTRICT or CITY from any liability for the claim, proceeding or action involved.

The specified insurance limits required in this Cooperative Agreement shall in no way limit or circumscribe DEVELOPER'S obligations to indemnify and hold harmless DISTRICT and CITY from third party claims.

In the event there is conflict between this section and California Civil Code Section 2782, this section shall be interpreted to comply with California Civil Code Section 2782. Such interpretation shall not relieve the DEVELOPER from indemnifying DISTRICT or CITY to the fullest extent allowed by law.

- 9. DEVELOPER for itself, its successors and assigns hereby releases DISTRICT and CITY, their respective officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims, demands, actions, or suits of any kind arising out of any liability, known or unknown, present or future, including, but not limited to any claim or liability, based or asserted, pursuant to Article I, Section 19 of the California Constitution, the Fifth Amendment of the United States Constitution, or any other law or ordinance which seeks to impose any other liability or damage, whatsoever, for damage caused by the discharge of drainage within or from PROJECT. Nothing contained herein shall constitute a release by DEVELOPER of DISTRICT or CITY, their officers, agents and employees from any and all claims, demands, actions or suits of any kind arising out of any liability, known or unknown, present or future, for the negligent maintenance of STORM DRAIN and APPURTENANCES by DISTRICT and CITY, respectively.
- 10. Any waiver by DISTRICT or by CITY of any breach of any one or more of the terms of this Cooperative Agreement shall not be construed to be a waiver of any subsequent

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or other breach of the same or of any other term hereof. Failure on the part of DISTRICT or CITY to require exact, full and complete compliance with any terms of this Cooperative Agreement shall not be construed as in any manner changing the terms hereof, or estopping DISTRICT or CITY from enforcement hereof.

11. Any and all notices sent or required to be sent to the parties of this Cooperative Agreement will be mailed by first class mail, postage prepaid, to the following addresses:

- 12. This Agreement is to be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. If any provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions will nevertheless continue in full force without being impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 13. Any action at law or in equity brought by any of the parties hereto for the purpose of enforcing a right or rights provided for by the Cooperative Agreement, shall be tried in a court of competent jurisdiction in the County of Riverside, State of California, and the parties hereto waive all provisions of law providing for a change of venue in such proceedings to any other county.
- 14. This Cooperative Agreement is the result of negotiations between the parties hereto, and the advice and assistance of their respective counsel. The fact that this Cooperative Agreement was prepared as a matter of convenience by DISTRICT shall have no import or

significance. Any uncertainty or ambiguity in this Cooperative Agreement shall not be construed against DISTRICT because DISTRICT prepared this Cooperative Agreement in its final form.

- 15. The rights and obligations of DEVELOPER shall inure to and be binding upon all heirs, successors and assignees.
- 16. DEVELOPER shall not assign or otherwise transfer any of its rights, duties or obligations hereunder to any person or entity without the written consent of the other parties hereto being first obtained. In the event of any such transfer or assignment, DEVELOPER expressly understands and agrees that it shall remain liable with respect to any and all of the obligations and duties contained in this Cooperative Agreement.
- 17. The individual(s) executing this Cooperative Agreement on behalf of DEVELOPER certify that they have the authority within their respective company(ies) to enter into and execute this Cooperative Agreement, and have been authorized to do so by all boards of directors, legal counsel, and / or any other board, committee or other entity within their respective company(ies) which have the authority to authorize or deny entering into this Cooperative Agreement.
- 18. This Cooperative Agreement is intended by the parties hereto as a final expression of their understanding with respect to the subject matter hereof and as a complete and exclusive statement of the terms and conditions thereof and supersedes any and all prior and contemporaneous agreements and understandings, oral or written, in connection therewith. This Cooperative Agreement may be changed or modified only upon the written consent of the parties hereto.

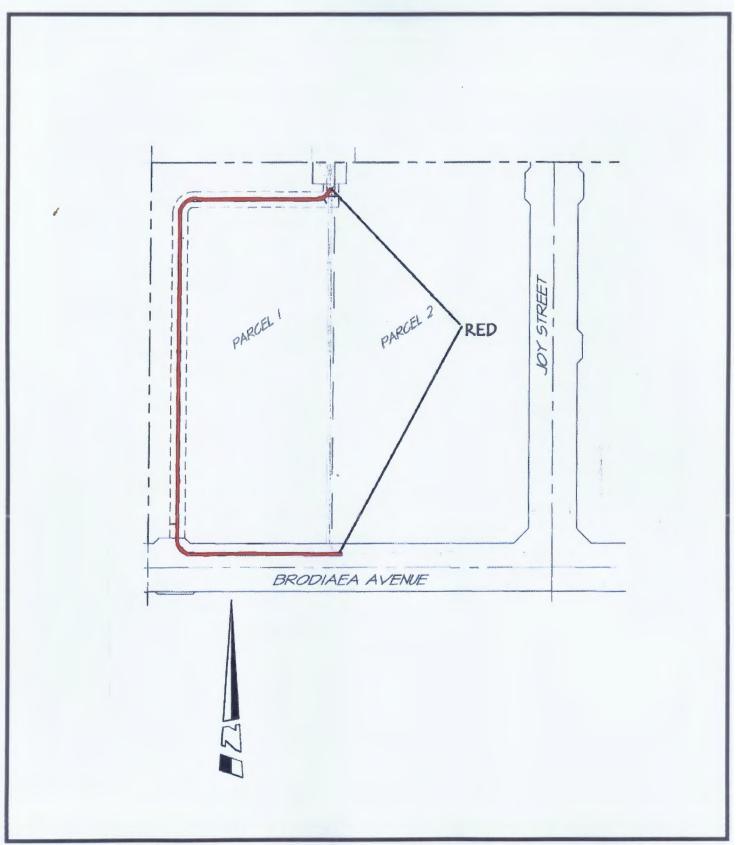

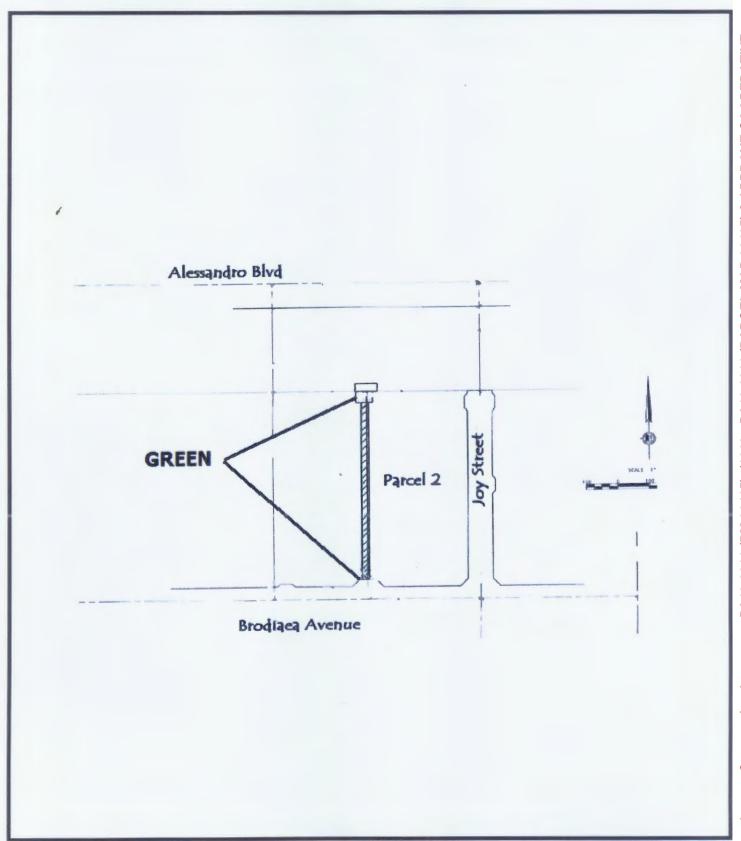

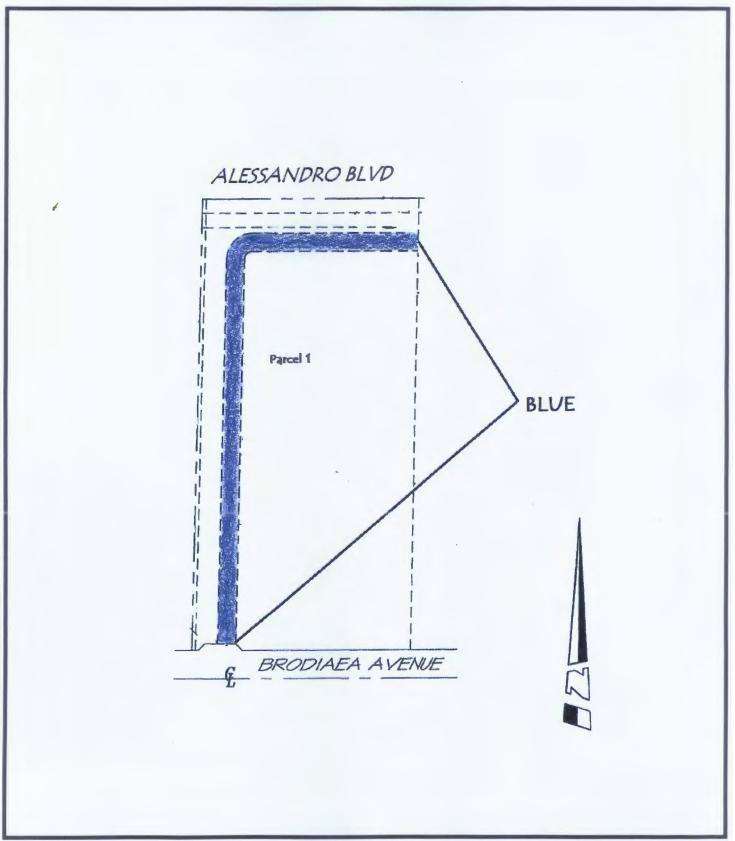

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

- Accept the Agreement and Cash Security for Public Improvements for Infinity RS, LLC.
- 2. Authorize the Mayor to execute the Agreement.
- 3. Direct the City Clerk to forward the signed Agreement to the County Recorder's Office for recordation.
- 4. Authorize the City Engineer to execute any future time extension amendments to the agreement, subject to City Attorney approval, if the required public improvements are not completed within said timeframe.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of the agreement by the City of Moreno Valley and Infinity RS, LLC, to construct the required public improvements that are located on the west side of Perris Boulevard and approximately 550 feet south of John F. Kennedy Drive. The project is funded by Infinity RS, LLC.

DISCUSSION

ID#1915 Page 1

On November 12, 2015, the Planning Commission of the City of Moreno Valley approved Conditional Use Permit PA15-0004. The developer proposes to develop a 2,995 square foot fast food restaurant with a drive-through on a 0.66 acre parcel. This project is located on the west side of Perris Boulevard and approximately 550 feet south of John F. Kennedy Drive.

Infinity RS LLC, the developer of this project, has completed an Agreement for Public Improvements. The developer agrees to perform and complete all of the required public improvements within six (6) months of the date the agreement is executed. The public improvements include, but are not limited to: sidewalk, parkway culverts (drains), driveway approach, street light, asphalt grind/overlay, striping, sewer lateral, water lateral, storm drain laterals with manholes, and undergrounding of overhead utilities. The public improvements are to be constructed along the west side of Perris Boulevard south of John F. Kennedy Drive. The City Engineer may execute any future amendments to the agreement, subject to City Attorney approval, if the required public improvements are not completed within said timeframe.

The Conditions of Approval for this project require that the developer provide surety for the required improvements. In lieu of the Faithful Performance Bond of \$160,000, and the Labor and Material Bond of \$80,000, the developer provided a cash deposit of \$240,000 to the City trust fund, under Land Development, to provide surety for the appropriate completion of the project.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff recommends this alternative to allow the project to move forward with development and construction of public improvements.
- 2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff does not recommend this alternative since it will not allow the project to move forward with development and construction of public improvements.

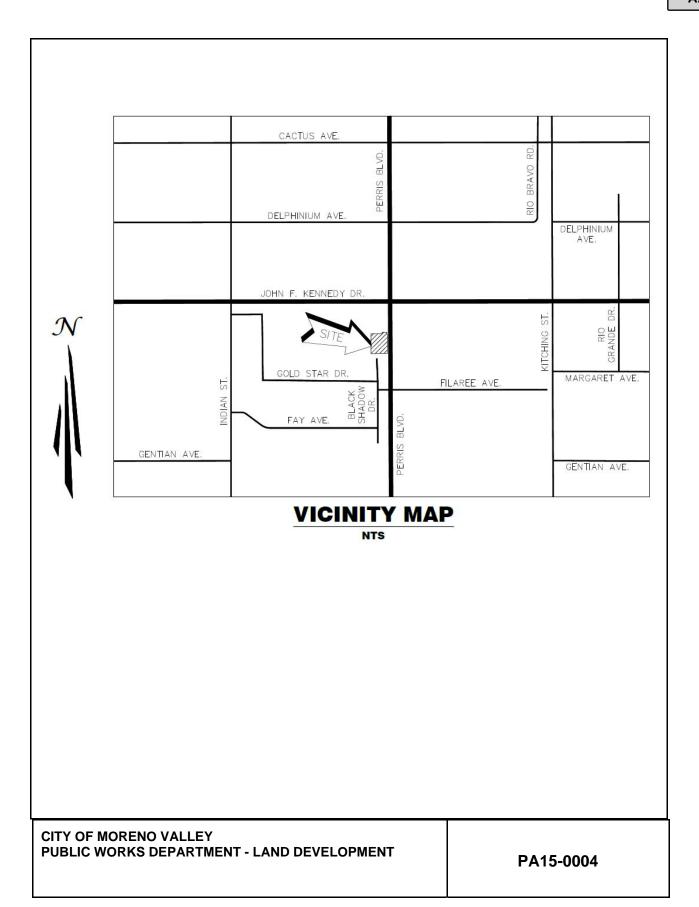

AGREEMENT FOR PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS FOR PROJECT NO. PA15-0004

This Agreement, made and entered into by and between the City of Moreno Valley, State of California, hereinafter called City, and **Infinity RS, LLC**, herein after called Developer, on the date the City signs this agreement.

WITNESSETH:

FIRST: Developer, for and in consideration of the approval by the City of the final map of that certain land division, or that certain other land development project, known as PA15-0004 agrees, at Developer's own expense, to furnish all labor, equipment and material necessary, and within SIX (6) months from the date this Agreement is executed, to perform and complete in a good and workmanlike manner, all of the required improvements in accordance with those improvement plans for said project which have been approved by the City Engineer, and are on file in the office of the City Engineer, and to do all work incidental thereto in accordance with the standards set forth in City ordinances and regulations, and pay all costs of engineering necessary in connection therewith, which are expressly made a part of this Agreement. All of the above required work shall be done under the inspection of and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and shall not be deemed complete until approved and accepted as complete by the City. Developer further agrees to quarantee the required improvements for a period of one year following acceptance by the City and during this one year period to repair and replace, to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, any defective work or labor done or defective materials furnished. Developer shall complete the improvements described in this paragraph pursuant to Section 66462, Government Code. Developer shall also complete any offsite improvements required as a condition of approval and with plans approved by the City Engineer at such time as the City acquires an interest in the land which will permit the improvements to be made, and the Developer waives the 120 day time limitation set forth in Section 66462.5, Government Code.

Security to guarantee the performance of this agreement shall be in the following amounts:

Faithful Performance security shall be in the sum of <u>ONE HUNDRED SIXTY THOUSAND AND NO/100</u> Dollars (***\$160,000.00***). The estimated cost of said work and improvements, pursuant to the Preliminary Estimate of Cost labeled Exhibit A attached hereto.

Labor and Material security shall be in the sum of <u>EIGHTY THOUSAND AND NO/100</u> Dollars (***\$80,000.00***). The estimated cost securing payment of labor and materials is fifty (50) percent of the total cost estimate of the improvements.

Developer further agrees to guarantee the required improvements for a period of one year following acceptance by the City and during this one year period to repair and replace, to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, any defective work or labor done or defective materials furnished. Upon entering the warranty period, the City shall retain ten percent of the original faithful performance security. Developer reserves the right to substitute the form of security, in accordance with the Moreno Valley Municipal Code, at any time during the term of this agreement, subject to approval of the City Engineer and City Attorney.

SECOND: Developer agrees to file with City, prior to the date this Agreement is executed, a good and sufficient improvement security in an amount not less than the estimated cost of the work and improvements for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and good and sufficient security for payment of labor and materials in the amount prescribed by City ordinances and regulations to secure the claims to which reference is made in Title 15 (commencing with Section 3082) of Part 4 of Division 3 of the Civil Code of the State of California. Developer agrees to renew each and every said security with good and sufficient sureties or increase the amounts of said securities, or both, within ten (10) days after being notified by the City Engineer that the sureties or amounts are insufficient. Notwithstanding any other provision herein, if Developer fails to take such action as is necessary to comply with said notice, he shall be in default of this

Agreement unless all required improvements are completed within thirty (30) days of the date on which the City Engineer notified the Developer of the insufficiency of said security. Security held by the City in the form of cash will not accrue interest

THIRD: Developer agrees to pay to the City the actual cost of such inspection of the works and improvements as may be required by the City Engineer. Developer further agrees that, if suit is brought upon this Agreement or any security guaranteeing the completion of the required improvements, all costs and reasonable expenses and fees incurred by the City in successfully enforcing such obligations shall be paid by Developer and guaranteed by the surety in addition to the face amount of the security, including reasonable attorney's fees, and that, upon entry of judgment, such costs, expenses and fees shall be taxed as costs and included in any judgment rendered.

FOURTH: To the furthest extent allowed by law, including California Civil Code Section 2782, Developer shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend City and each of its officers, officials, employees and agents from any and all claims, losses, liabilities, fines, penalties, forfeitures, costs and damages (whether in contract, tort or strict liability, including, but not limited to personal injury, death at any time and/or property damage) incurred by City or any other Person, and from any and all claims, demands and actions in law or equity (including attorney's fees and litigation expenses), arising or alleged to have arisen directly or indirectly out of the performance of this Agreement, including but not limited to the alleged acts or omissions of any contractor, subcontractor, employee or agent acting on behalf of Developer or the design of any improvements to be constructed pursuant to this Agreement or the use of any patent or patented article in the performance of this Agreement.

Developer's obligations to indemnify and hold City harmless shall apply in all instances except those claims caused by the active negligence, sole negligence, or willful misconduct of City or any of its officers, officials, employees or agents. Developer's obligations to defend the City and provide a legal defense (including the retention of attorneys acceptable to City and all legal costs and expenses) shall apply in all instances, except those claims arising out of the sole negligence or the willful misconduct of City or any of its officers, officials, employees or agents.

If Developer retains any contractor or subcontractor to perform any of the Work to be performed under this Agreement, Developer shall require each contractor or subcontractor to indemnify, hold harmless and defend City and each of its officers, officials, employees and agents in accordance with the terms of the preceding paragraphs.

Developer's obligations under his section shall survive the completion of any work to be performed by Developer, the City's inspection and/or acceptance of any work performed by Developer, as well as the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

Developer's provision of insurance, as required below, does not terminate, alter, limit or satisfy Developer's defense and indemnity obligations provided for herein.

FIFTH: Throughout the life of the Agreement, Developer shall pay for and maintain in full force and effect all policies of insurance required hereunder with an insurance company (ies) either (I) admitted by the California Insurance Commissioner to do business in the State of California and rated not less than "A-VII" in Best's Insurance Rating Guide, or (ii) as authorized by the City Manager or his/her designee. The following policies of insurance are required:

(i) COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY insurance which shall be at least as broad as the most current version of Insurance Services Office (ISO) Commercial General Liability Coverage Form CG 00 01 and include insurance for "bodily injury," "property damage" and "personal and advertising injury" with coverage for premises and operations (including the use of owned and non-owned equipment), products and completed operations, and contractual liability (including, without limitation, indemnity obligations under the Contract) with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage, \$1,000,000 per

occurrence for personal and advertising injury, \$2,000,000 aggregate for products and completed operations and \$2,000,000 general aggregate.

- (ii) COMMERCIAL AUTOMOBILE LIABILITY insurance which shall be at least as broad as the most current version of Insurance Services Office (ISO) form CA 00 01 and shall include coverage for "any auto" with limits of liability of not less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily and property damage. Commercial Automobile Liability coverage is required if automobiles are to be operated on city-owned property or within City right-of-way.
- (iii) WORKERS' COMPENSATION insurance as required under the California Labor Code.

Developer shall be responsible for payment of any deductibles or self-insured retentions contained in any insurance policies required hereunder.

All policies of insurance required hereunder shall be endorsed to provide that the coverage shall not be cancelled, non-renewed, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) calendar day written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the City. Upon issuance by the insurer, broker or agent of a notice of cancellation, non-renewal or reduction in coverage or limits, Developer shall furnish City with a new certificate and applicable endorsements for such policy(ies). In the event any policy(ies) is due to expire before the completion of the work, Developer shall provide a new certificate and all applicable endorsements evidencing renewal of such policy(ies) not less than 15 calendar days prior to the expiration date of the expiring policy(ies).

The General Liability and Automobile Liability insurance policies shall be written on an occurrence form and endorsed to name the City and its officers, officials, employees and agents as additional insured's. Such policy(ies) of insurance shall be endorsed so Developer's insurance shall be primary and no contribution shall be required of City. Any Workers' Compensation insurance policy shall contain a waiver of subrogation as to City, its officers, officials, employees and agents. Developer shall furnish City with the certificate(s) and applicable endorsements for all required insurance fourteen (14) days prior to the start of work. NOTE: A Certificate of Insurance is not acceptable. The Certificate of Insurance must be accompanied by the additional insured and primary insurance endorsements.

If Developer retains any contractor or subcontractor to perform any of the Work to be performed under this Agreement, Developer shall require each contractor or subcontractor to provide insurance protection in favor of City, its officers, officials, employees and agents in accordance with the terms of the Agreement. Any contractor or subcontractor performing work on behalf of Developer shall likewise be required to name City its officers, officials, employees and agents as additional insured's as required herein. Developer shall obtain certificates and endorsements from such contractors or subcontractors before the commencement of any work.

At any time during the Agreement, upon request of City, Developer shall immediately furnish City with a complete copy of any insurance policy required under this Agreement, including all endorsements, with said copy certified by the underwriter to be a true and correct copy of the original policy.

If at any time Developer fails to maintain the required insurance in full force and effect, all work permitted thereunder shall be discontinued immediately until notice is received by City that the required insurance has been restored to full force and effect and that the premiums therefore have been paid for a period satisfactory to City. Any failure by Developer to provide or maintain the required insurance shall be considered a material breach of the Agreement.

The fact that insurance is obtained by Developer shall not be deemed to release or diminish its liability, including but not limited to, liability under the indemnity provisions on this Agreement. Developer's duty to defend and indemnify City shall apply to all claims and liabilities, regardless of whether any insurance policies are applicable. The policy limits stated herein do not act as a limitation upon the amount of indemnification required to be provided by Developer.

SIXTH: The Developer hereby grants to the City and/or to any authorized agent or employee of the City, the irrevocable permission to enter upon the lands of the above-referenced land division for the purpose of completing the improvements. This permission shall terminate in the event that the Developer has completed the work within the time specified or any extension thereof granted by the City.

SEVENTH: Developer agrees at all times, up to the completion and acceptance of the improvements by the City, to give good and adequate warning to the traveling public of each and every dangerous condition caused by the construction of the improvements, and to protect the traveling public from such defective or dangerous conditions. The Developer shall keep all traveled ways that are a part of, or affected by the construction of this project free and clear of mud, dirt and debris and shall provide twice monthly street sweeping service. A copy of the contract for street sweeping service shall be provided to the City. The Developer's obligation under this provision shall be secured by the security securing performance of this Agreement.

EIGHTH: The Developer, his agents and employees, shall give notice to the City Engineer at least 48 hours before beginning any work and shall furnish said City Engineer all reasonable facilities for obtaining full information with respect to the progress and manner of work.

NINETH: If the Developer, or his agents or employees, neglects, refuses, or fails to prosecute the work with such diligence as to insure its completion within the specified time, or within such extensions of time as have been granted by the City, or if the Developer violates, neglects, refuses, or fails to perform satisfactorily any of the provisions of the plans and specifications, he shall be in default of this Agreement and notice in writing of such default shall be served upon him. The City Council shall have the power, on recommendation by the City Engineer, to terminate all rights of the Developer because of such default. The determination by the City Engineer of the question as to whether any of the terms of the Agreement or specifications have been violated, or have not been performed satisfactorily, shall be conclusive upon the Developer, and any and all parties who may have any interest in the Agreement or any portion thereof. The foregoing provisions of this section shall be in addition to all other rights and remedies available to the City under law.

TENTH: It is further agreed by and between the parties hereto, that in the event it is deemed necessary to extend the time of completion of the work contemplated to be done under this Agreement, extensions of time **may** be granted by the City from time to time, either at its own option, or upon request of Developer, and such extensions shall in no way affect the validity of this Agreement or release the surety or sureties on said security, Developer further agrees to maintain the aforesaid security in full force and effect during the terms of this Agreement, including any extensions of time as may be granted therein.

ELEVENTH: It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto that if any part, term or provision of this Agreement is by the courts held to be unlawful and void, the validity of the remaining portions shall not be affected and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be construed and enforced as if the Agreement did not contain the particular part, term or provision held to be invalid.

TWELFTH: In the event legal action is required to enforce the terms of the Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover attorney's fees and costs, including expert fees.

THIRTEENTH: Any notice or notices required or permitted to be given pursuant to this Agreement shall be served on the other party by mail, postage prepaid, at the following addresses:

Recommendations:

- Approve the City of Moreno Valley's Measure A Local Streets and Roads Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan for Fiscal Years 2016/17 – 2020/21 and Maintenance of Effort Certification for Fiscal Year 2016/17.
- 2. Authorize submittal of the Measure A Local Streets and Roads Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan for Fiscal Years 2016/17 2020/21 and Maintenance of Effort Certification for Fiscal Year 2016/17 to the Riverside County Transportation Commission.
- 3. Authorize staff to submit an amended five year plan to the Riverside County Transportation Commission if changes are made by City Council to the listed Measure A projects as part of the upcoming FY 2016/17 budget approval process.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of the City of Moreno Valley's Measure A Local Streets and Roads Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for Fiscal Years 2016/17 – 2020/21 and Maintenance of Effort (MOE) Certification for FY 2016/17. Annual submittal of the Measure A CIP and MOE to the Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC) is required for continued receipt of Measure A funds.

DISCUSSION

Measure A is a major funding source for transportation infrastructure improvements. The City is scheduled to receive \$3,611,000 in Measure A revenue by Fiscal Year (FY) 2015/16 year-end and \$3,889,000 in funding for FY 2016/17.

RCTC requires all local jurisdictions to submit an annual five-year CIP for continued receipt of Measure A Local Streets and Roads funds. The attached tables include proposed projects for FY 2016/17 and planned transportation related operating budgets and debt service payments for FY 2017/18 through FY 2020/21. The listed projects are consistent with the City's Capital Improvement Plan. All identified projects meet the criteria for Measure A funding. As required by RCTC, the attached tables include a Project Status Report for FY 2015/16 Council approved CIP projects. The purpose of this report is to document progress to date on engineering, right-of-way acquisition, construction, and anticipated project completion date. The operating budgets and annual debt service obligations in the Measure A Fund eliminate the availability of this revenue source for construction of new CIP projects in future years.

The projects are included in the Measure A Five-Year CIP to satisfy RCTC Ordinance No. 02-001. Although RCTC requires this information by May 9, 2016, the City Council may make any changes to the list of projects as part of the City's annual CIP budget approval process. City staff can forward the amended Measure A project list to RCTC once the City's budget is approved.

RCTC Ordinance No. 02-001 also requires the City to provide an executed MOE Certification Statement indicating that Measure A funds will not replace local discretionary funds used for the City's transportation issues, but will be in addition to the City's funds for transportation purposes. The MOE base year amount, approved by the RCTC at its July 2011 meeting, is \$1,459,153. The MOE requirement is met by the Public Works Department General Fund operating budgets and by a contribution from the General Fund to the Gas Tax Fund.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Staff recommends approval and authorization of the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. RCTC requires all cities within its jurisdiction to submit a plan by May 9, 2016. This alternative allows the City to continue receiving Measure A revenue annually to fund significant roadway and other transportation related infrastructure improvements. The approval of this plan does not in any way affect the City Council's deliberation and decisions on the approval of the City's overall CIP budget in May 2016.
- 2. Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. RCTC requires all cities within its jurisdiction to submit a plan by May 9, 2016. This alternative jeopardizes the Measure A revenue funding stream for the City, significantly affecting the ability to deliver critical CIP projects. Staff does not recommend this action.

FISCAL IMPACT

The timely approval and submittal of the Measure A Five-Year CIP by May 9, 2016, ensures continued receipt of Measure A funds for FY 2015/16. City staff can forward an amended Measure A project list to RCTC once City Council approves the FY 16/17 City budget. Measure A funds can only be used for transportation related purposes.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendation:

1. Adopt Resolution No. 2016-17. Authorizing the Submittal of Applications for Payment Programs and Related Authorizations Under the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle).

SUMMARY

This report recommends adoption of the proposed resolution which will authorize the City to submit applications for the City/County Payment Program (CCPP) grant for any and all payment programs offered, in accordance with CalRecycle's new guidelines. The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle) administers the CCCP. As part of its program, CalRecycle issues grants to local governments for the application of beverage container recycling and litter cleanup activities. Adoption of the proposed resolution would allow staff to continue to properly pursue grant funds on behalf of the City in the future.

DISCUSSION

The Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle), in accordance with California Public Resources Code (PRC) Section 14581(a)(3)(A) of the California Beverage Container Recycling and Litter Reduction Act, provides up to \$11 million annually in payments to local governments for implementation of local beverage container recycling and litter cleanup activities under the City/County Payment Program

ID#1953 Page 1

(CCPP). The goal of CalRecycle's beverage container recycling program is to achieve and sustain an 80 percent recycling rate for all California Refund Value (CRV) beverage containers. Projects implemented by cities and counties assist in reaching and maintaining this goal.

CalRecycle has implemented new reporting requirements which are effective for the 2015-2016 funding cycle. In addition to reporting on all expenditures, per the new requirements all participants are mandated to submit a resolution pertaining specifically to the CCCP which authorizes the City to submit applications to CalRecycle for any and all payment programs offered, and designates the City Manager signature authority to execute all related documents. As a result of these changes, a resolution is needed to sustain all opportunities for available funding to promote beverage container recycling and litter abatement programs. Failure to meet this requirement may result in the denial of future funding. No other changes in the implementation and administration of the CCCP are anticipated.

The City has participated in the CCCP since 2010, and has received between \$40,000 and \$60,000 in grant funds each fiscal year of participation. These funds have assisted the City in providing outreach and assistance to businesses, schools, and the public regarding mandatory recycling requirements, including the recycling of beverage containers. Additionally, the funds have assisted the City in meeting the requirements set forth by the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 now known as AB 939 and the Mandatory Commercial Recycling bill referred to as AB 341. AB 939 mandates the implementation of outreach and local waste requirements geared towards the platform of "reduce, re-use and recycle," to divert recyclable materials from landfills. Per AB 939, all local jurisdictions must meet an annual 50% waste diversion rate in order to remain in compliance. Expanding on AB 939, AB 341 mandates local jurisdictions implement outreach efforts to increase recycling in the commercial and multi-family sectors. The bill targets generators who produce over seventy percent of solid waste generated in California. The City has met and exceeded the State's waste diversion rate requirements since implementation of the outreach efforts required per AB 341, and funded by the CCCP.

Continued participation in the CCCP affords the City the opportunity to increase public awareness of recycling as, required by AB 341, which assists with the City's overall diversion efforts mandated by AB 939. Therefore, City staff requests that City Council approve the adoption of the resolution in order to help secure funding for the administration and implementation of the City/County Payment Program.

ALTERNATIVES

1. Staff recommends adoption of the proposed resolution authorizing application for all available grants under the California Department Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle). This alternative will provide for continued participation in the City County Payment Program which affords the City the opportunity to increase public awareness of recycling and assists with the City's overall

- diversion efforts mandated by the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939).
- 2. Staff does not recommend not adopting the proposed resolution authorizing application for all available grants under the California Department Resources Recycling and Recovery (CalRecycle). This alternative will possibly result in a loss of \$40,000 to \$60,000 of City County Payment Program (CCPP) grant funds per fiscal year.

FISCAL IMPACT

Participation in and compliance with the City County Payment Program allows the City to be eligible for grant revenue reimbursement for public education, bottles and cans recycling and litter abatement programs ranging from an estimated \$40,000 to \$60,000 per fiscal year. The approval of the proposed resolution shall authorize the City to apply and remain eligible for the grant funds.

There is no matching funds requirement for this grant. Grant funds must be spent within two (2) years of the grant award and may only be used for the activities and materials specified in the grant application.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

- Award to Altec, Inc of Creedmoor, NC, for the purchase of three 2016 Dodge Ram 5500 chassis trucks with Articulating Aerial Bucket, Altec Model AT40M, and:
- 2. Authorize the Purchasing & Facilities Division Manager to issue a purchase order to Altec, Inc in the amount of \$396,789.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval to purchase three replacement maintenance bucket trucks for an existing 1989 Ford Super Duty model, an existing 1998 GMC 6500 model, and an existing 2005 Chevrolet C7500 maintenance bucket truck, all that are at the end of their useful life. This purchase is funded through Capital Equipment Replacement funds appropriated within the General Fund, and was approved in the FY 2015/16 – 2016/17 Operating Budget by the City Council on June 23, 2015.

DISCUSSION

The three maintenance bucket trucks to be replaced are a Model 1989 Ford Super Duty, a Model 1998 GMC 6500, and a Model 2005 Chevrolet C7500. They have exceeded their normal life cycles and are critical to traffic maintenance operations. These vehicles are in poor mechanical condition and require expensive repairs due to years of heavy use. Replacements for these vehicles are imperative to maintain traffic

maintenance services. City Council approved an appropriation of \$2,482,909 on June 23, 2015 for fleet replacement from account 1010-70-78-45370-660322. The city's fleet, consisting of five (5) bucket truck vehicles, will remain at its current level. The three bucket trucks being replaced will be retired and surplused.

Although other bucket truck manufacturers are available for competitive award, the Altec brand is best suited for the City. The reasons the Altec is the best unit for the City is:

- Operator safety utilizing familiar brand of vehicle and articulating aerial bucket device
- 2. Equipment design is one with which in-house Vehicle/Equipment staff has familiarity
- 3. Parts and warranty repair consistency with a local available vendor

Per the Moreno Valley Municipal Code, Section 3.12.260, "Where advantageous for the City and to the extent consistent with state law, the City Manager may authorize the Financial & Administrative Services Director or the Purchasing Manager to purchase supplies, materials, equipment or contractual services through legal, competitively awarded contracts with or of other governmental jurisdictions or public agencies, including California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) commonly referred to as "piggybacking," without further contracting, solicitation or formal bidding as described in this chapter. (Ord. 624 § 1.7, 2003: Ord. 587 § 2.1 (part), 2001)".

The National Joint Powers Alliance (NJPA) Cooperative Purchasing Agreement – Contract #031014-ALT, was competitively solicited and awarded to Altec, Incorporated, manufacturer of aerial lifts and specialty equipment for the tree care maintenance industries, on May 1, 2014 and expires on April 30, 2018. Staff believes the NJPA contract provides the most competitive pricing and highest quality equipment to the City, thereby offering the best value.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Award to Altec, Incorporated of Creedmoor, NC, for the purchase of three 2016 Dodge Ram 5500 chassis trucks with Articulating Aerial Bucket, Altec Model AT40M; and authorize the Purchasing & Facilities Division Manager to issue a purchase order to Altec, Incorporated in the amount of \$396,789. (Staff recommends this action as it is consistent with the best practice of replacing vehicles that exceed their useful life to support a cost-effective fleet replacement/maintenance program and provide reliable equipment for City maintenance programs.)
- 2. Reject the award and purchase order in the amount of \$396,789 to Altec, Incorporated for the purchase of three Dodge Ram 5500 traffic maintenance bucket trucks and direct staff on alternative actions. (Staff does not recommend this action as this may result in excessive maintenance costs

to maintain the existing vehicles, which have exceeded their normal lifecycle, and result in related potential down-time of the traffic maintenance program supported by this vehicle.)

FISCAL IMPACT

The City Council approved an appropriation of \$2,482,909 on June 23, 2015 for fleet replacement; this appropriation included the purchase of one tree truck from General Fund. These funds are in account 1010-70-78-45370-660322. No additional appropriation is required.

Recommendations:

- Award to Mar-Co Equipment Company, for the purchase of two 2016 Freightliner M2-112 chassis trucks with Tymco Regenerative Air Sweepers, Model 500X, and:
- 2. Authorize the Purchasing & Facilities Division Manager to issue a purchase order to Mar-Co Equipment Company in the amount of \$715,548.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval to purchase two replacement street sweeper trucks for an existing 1996 Athey Mobil M9D model and an existing 2005 Sterling SC8000 model that are at the end of their useful life. This purchase is funded through Capital Equipment Replacement funds appropriated within the General Fund, and was approved in the FY 2015/16 – 2016/17 Operating Budget by the City Council on June 23, 2015.

DISCUSSION

The two units to be replaced are a Model 1996 Athey Mobil M9D and a Model 2005 Sterling SC8000 street sweeping trucks. They have exceeded their normal life cycle and are critical to street maintenance operations. These vehicles are in poor mechanical condition and require expensive repairs due to years of heavy use. Replacements for these vehicles are imperative to maintain street maintenance services. City Council

ID#1968 Page 1

approved an appropriation of \$2,482,909 on June 23, 2015 for fleet replacement from account 1010-70-78-45370-660322. The street maintenance street sweeping fleet, consisting of four (4) vehicles, will remain at its current level. The two street sweeper trucks being replaced will be retired and surplused.

Although other street sweeper truck manufacturers are available for competitive award, the Tymco brand is best suited for the City. The reasons the Tymco is the best unit for the City is that it is the only known model of a compressed natural gas (CNG) fueled, regenerative air sweeper with a hydraulic-operated hopper capable of being raised vertically to allow a "high-dump" action, which is required given the City's operational practices for the street sweeping program. The addition of two regenerative air sweepers, to complement the existing two broom sweepers, will also enhance the range of equipment within the street sweeping program to address specific situations and needs, such as post-storm cleanup activities.

Per the Moreno Valley Municipal Code, Section 3.12.260, "Where advantageous for the City and to the extent consistent with state law, the City Manager may authorize the Financial & Administrative Services Director or the Purchasing Manager to purchase supplies, materials, equipment or contractual services through legal, competitively awarded contracts with or of other governmental jurisdictions or public agencies, including California Multiple Award Schedules (CMAS) commonly referred to as "piggybacking," without further contracting, solicitation or formal bidding as described in this chapter. (Ord. 624 § 1.7, 2003: Ord. 587 § 2.1 (part), 2001)".

The City of Riverside competitively solicited and awarded to Mar-Co Equipment Company, manufacturer of street sweepers for municipal agencies, contractors and airport industry. On May 21, 2015, the City of Riverside opened bids for Bid No. 7326 and awarded Mar-Co Equipment Company. Staff believes the City of Riverside's contract provides the most competitive pricing and highest quality equipment to the City, thereby offering the best value.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Award to Mar-Co Equipment Company of Pomona, CA, for the purchase of two 2016 Freightliner M2-112 chassis trucks with Regenerative Air Sweeper, Tymco Model 500X; and authorize the Purchasing & Facilities Division Manager to issue a purchase order to Mar-Co Equipment Company in the amount of \$715,548. (Staff recommends this action as it is consistent with the best practice of replacing vehicles that exceed their useful life to support a cost-effective fleet replacement/maintenance program and provide reliable equipment for City maintenance programs.)
- 2. Reject the award and purchase order in the amount of \$715,548 to Mar-Co Equipment Company for the purchase of two Freightliner M2-112 street sweepers and direct staff on alternative actions. (Staff does not recommend this action as this may result in excessive maintenance costs to maintain the existing vehicles, which have exceeded their normal life-cycle, and result in related potential down-time of the street sweeping maintenance

program supported by this vehicle.)

FISCAL IMPACT

The City Council approved an appropriation of \$2,482,909 on June 23, 2015 for fleet replacement. These funds are in account 1010-70-78-45370-660322. No additional appropriation is required.

ISSUE:

Consideration to award Bid No. 7326 to Mar-Co Equipment Company in the amount of \$354,291.90 for one Compressed Natural Gas Regenerative Air Street Sweeper.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council award Bid No. 7326 to Mar-Co Equipment Company of Pomona, California, in the amount of \$354,291.90 for one Compressed Natural Gas Regenerative Air Street Sweeper.

BACKGROUND:

The Purchasing Division, in cooperation with the General Services and Public Works Departments, recently solicited formal bids for the purchase of one Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) Regenerative Air Street Sweeper. Adding the regenerative air sweeper to the street sweeping program will allow removal of various types of debris that the current broom sweepers cannot process such as fine sand, silt and pine needles. This particular system uses a controlled blast of air to dislodge debris from the surface then the debris is picked-up by a heavy duty suction head. Regenerative air system exhaust air is not discharged into the atmosphere like a traditional brush and vacuum sweeper.

One bid was submitted by Mar-Co Equipment Company in the amount of \$354,291.90. The bid was deemed responsive and there were no exceptions to the bid requirements. The bid also meets the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) Rule 1186.1 (Less Polluting Sweepers) which requires certain public and private sweeper fleet operators to acquire alternative-fuel or otherwise less-polluting sweepers when purchasing or leasing these vehicles for sweeping operations undertaken by or for government entities in the jurisdiction of the SCAQMD.

The Public Works Director and Purchasing Services Manager concur with the recommendation above.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The total vehicle cost is \$354,291.90. Sufficient funds are available in the Public Works Department Automotive Equipment Account No. 4130400-462100. It is anticipated that the Public Works Department will be reimbursed up to \$30,000 in Mobile Source Air Pollution Reduction Review Committee grant funds to partially offset the cost of this vehicle.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendation:

 Approve Resolution No. 2016-18. A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley, California, to Amend the Electric Rates for Moreno Valley Utility (MVU).

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of a resolution that would amend Moreno Valley Utility rates to correspond with Southern California Edison rates that became effective on January 1, 2016.

Resolution 2015-32, adopted by the City Council on May 12, 2015, approved the adjustment of MVU rates two times per year (in the spring and the fall) to provide rate stability to its customers. These semi-annual adjustments also allow the rates to be adjusted to correspond with the SCE electric rates as required under the current ENCO agreement and City Council policy.

The proposed adjustments were presented to the Finance Subcommittee on March 16 and to the Utilities Commission on March 25, 2016.

DISCUSSION

Staff recommends approval of the resolution that will amend the electric rates for the Moreno Valley Utility (MVU) to correspond with rates charged by Southern California

ID#1973 Page 1

Edison (SCE). Since the inception of MVU, City Council policy has been to maintain parity with SCE electric rates. Resolution 2006-112 approved implementing a schedule to adjust MVU's rates to correspond with the SCE rate schedule. This policy is also incorporated within the Professional Services Agreement with ENCO Utility Services Moreno Valley, LLC, which requires that MVU adjusts its electric rates to have them correspond with those charged by SCE. In addition, Resolution 2015-32, adopted by the City Council on May 12, 2015, approved the adjustment of MVU rates two times per year (in the spring and the fall) to provide rate stability to its customers.

Effective January 1, 2016, SCE implemented rate adjustments as depicted in the table below. The recommended adjustments ensure compliance with the policies and resolutions noted above.

As with all electric utilities, Moreno Valley Utility's service year is divided into two categories: Winter (October to June) and Summer (June to October). Adjustments to the rates to have them correspond with the SCE rates as presented in this report will generally decrease MVU's rate schedules for both the summer season and the winter season.

Rates are structured to reflect usage; the table below shows the monthly impact to customers during the summer season and winter season.

WHEREAS, the City of Moreno Valley (the "City"), a municipal corporation, is authorized pursuant to Article XI, Section 9(a) of the California Constitution to establish, purchase, and operate public works to furnish its inhabitants with light, water, power, heat, transportation, or means of communication; and

WHEREAS, on June 26, 2001, the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley approved Resolution No. 2001-33 and, as amended by Resolution 2002-46, authorized the formation of a municipally owned utility for the purpose of providing electrical power, storm water, telephone telecommunications, cable TV, water, natural gas, and sanitary sewer; and

WHEREAS, on July 8, 2003, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2003-58 adopting the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges document for Moreno Valley Utility which states, in part, that the rates to be charged by and paid to the City for electric service will be the rates legally in effect and on file with the City Council; and

WHEREAS, on January 13, 2004, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2004-05 establishing the electric rates for Moreno Valley Utility; and

WHEREAS, on September 26, 2006, the City Council approved Resolution No. 2006-112 implementing a schedule to adjust Moreno Valley Utility electric rates to reflect the same schedule as Southern California Edison; and

WHEREAS, there are sections of the Electric Service Rules, Fees and Charges document that contain rules which define the terms and conditions under which electric service will be provided to the customer; and

WHEREAS, there are rules, fees, charges, and rates associated with providing the services identified in these documents. These rules, fees, charges, and rates are deemed necessary and equitable for services rendered and are required to fund in whole or in part, all of the services required to facilitate the delivery of electric distribution pursuant to the rules; and

WHEREAS, Urgency Ordinance No. 651 was adopted by the City Council on December 9, 2003, allowing for the adoption of rates by resolution.

Resolution No. 2016-18 Date Adopted: April 19, 2016 NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Applying for the Medical Baseline Allocation:

- 1. Request application from Moreno Valley Utility by telephone, mail or in person
- 2. Complete application.
- 3. The patient's physician will need to fill out the required information on the application and sign it certifying the medical need.
- 4. The customer can mail or bring the application to Moreno Valley Utility's offices
- 5. Once the application is reviewed and approved, the Medical Baseline Allocation will be effective on the next regular electric billing.
- 6. Applications must be renewed every two years.
- 7. Low Income Program A low-income assistance discount program is offered under this standard residential rate. To be considered for this discount, an application must be filed with Moreno Valley Utility. To be eligible for this discount, the income of the customer, including all members of the household,

must meet the income levels of the program and can be no more than 200% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. Under this program a discount for qualified low-income residents of 20% is provided on monthly energy charges. Discount applies to energy charges only. The customer charge, public purpose charge, service fees and all taxes are calculated at the standard rates.

8. Family Electric Rate Assistance (FERA) Program: The FERA discount program is offered under the standard residential rate. To be considered for this discount, an application must be filed with Moreno Valley Utility. To be eligible for this discount the household must consist of three or more persons where the total gross income from all sources is no more than 250% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. Under this program a discount for qualified FERA households of 12% is provided on monthly energy charges. Discount applies to energy charges only. - 2. Voltage: Service will be supplied at one standard voltage.
- 3. Billing Demand: The Billing Demand shall be the kilowatts of Maximum Demand, determined to the nearest kW. The Billing Demand shall be the greater of the kilowatts of Maximum Demand recorded (or established for) the monthly billing period or 50% of the highest Maximum Demand established in the preceding eleven months (Ratcheted Demand).
- 4. Maximum Demand: The maximum demand in any month shall be the measured maximum average kilowatt input, indicated or recorded by instruments to be supplied by the City, during any 15-minute metered interval in the month.
- 5. Voltage Discount: The monthly Facilities Related Demand Charge will be reduced by 23.3% for service delivered and metered at voltages of 4 kV through 12 kV. The energy charge will be reduced by \$.00074 per kWh for service delivered and metered at voltages of 2 kV through 12 kV.
- 6. Excess Transformer Capacity: Excess Transformer Capacity is the amount of transformer capacity requested by a customer in excess of that which the City would normally install to serve the customer's Maximum Demand. Excess Transformer Capacity shall be billed at the amount shown in the rates section above.
- 7. Power Factor Adjustment: When Maximum Demand has exceeded 200 kW for three consecutive months, kilovar metering will be installed as soon as practical, and thereafter, until the Maximum Demand has been less than 150 kW for twelve consecutive months, the billing will be adjusted each month for power factor.
 - a. Adjustment Rate:
 - For service delivered and metered at voltages 12 kV or less, the billing will be increased by \$0.51 per kilovar of maximum reactive demand.
 - b. Determining the Reactive Demand:

- i. Service delivered and metered at voltages of 4 kV or greater:
 - The maximum reactive demand shall be the highest measured maximum average kilovar demand indicated or recorded by metering during any 15-minute metered interval in the month. The kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A device will be installed on each kilovar meter to prevent reverse operation of the meter.
 - ii. Services delivered and metered at voltages less than 4 kV:
 - For customers with metering used for billing that measures reactive demand, the maximum reactive demand shall be the highest measured maximum average kilovar demand indicated or recorded by metering during any 15-minute metered interval in the month. The kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A device will be installed on each kilovar meter to prevent reverse operation of the meter.
 - 2. For customers with metering used for billing that measures kilovar-hours instead of reactive demand, the kilovars of reactive demand shall be calculated by multiplying the kilowatts of measured maximum demand by the ratio of the kilovar-hours to the kilowatt-hours. Demands in kilowatts and kilovars shall be determined to the nearest unit. A ratchet device will be installed on the kilovar-hour meter to prevent its reverse operation on leading power factors.

- 5. Maximum Demand: The maximum demand in any month shall be the measured maximum average kilowatt input, indicated or recorded by instruments to be supplied by the City, during any 15-minute metered interval in the month.

Excess Transformer Capacity: Transformer Capacity is the amount of transformer capacity requested by a customer in excess of that which the City would normally install to serve the customer's Maximum Demand. - NEM customers will receive a credit for the surplus electricity supplied to MVU's system.
- 2. This credit will be applied to the customer's energy bill, to offset all or part of the costs associated with the energy that is consumed each month.
- 3. Residential accounts are billed once a year for "net" energy consumed or generated over the previous 12 months, if any.
- 4. Small business accounts served under the General Service Rate also qualify for annual billing.
- 5. Large business NEM accounts under the Large General Service Rate are billed monthly for their energy usage.
- Net surplus energy is the amount of generated kilowatt-hours (kWh) energy that is exported to MVU's system that exceeds the amount that is received from MVU.
- 7. Any net surplus energy remaining at the end of the 12-month billing period (also called the "relevant period") will be given a monetary value known as the Net Surplus Compensation Rate (NSCR).
- 8. The NSCR value is established by MVU to reflect the costs MVU avoids in procuring power during the time period net surplus generators are likely to produce excess power.

- 9. Customers may choose to either roll over the monetary value of any net surplus energy to the next billing cycle, or receive payment for any net surplus energy at the end of your 12-month relevant period.
- 10. Customers will be billed monthly for nominal non-energy-related charges such as taxes.

SCHEDULE ED - ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ("ED") RATE

Applicability

Commercial or industrial end-use customers that would otherwise receive service under Electric Rate Schedule TOU-LGS (Time of Use-Large General Service) and meet certain criteria as established and adopted by resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley may take advantage of the ED rate as a New Customer or Expanded Load Customer. This ED rate is applicable to all or part of the services provided to New Customers and Expanded Load Customers, as such terms are defined herein. Local Hiring Incentive applicable to certain other rate classes as described in Special Condition No. 6.

The ED rate will only be applied to the expanded load as determined in Section 5 below.
- 3. A New Customer shall meet the following criteria:

 - i. Logistics/Distribution
 - ii. Medical/Healthcare
 - iii. Auto Dealerships
 - b.Job Creation

i. Tier 1 Discount Rateii. Tier 2 Discount Rate500 – 999 jobs

iii. Tier 3 Discount Rate greater than 1000 jobsiv. Tier 4 Discount Rate 350 jobs minimumv. Tier 5 Discount Rate 200 jobs minimum

c. City Revenue Producer – either sales tax or use tax generation

Special Conditions

- 1. <u>Term</u>: Economic Development Rate Agreements entered into under this Schedule shall be for a single five-year term, except for Tier 5, which shall be for a single sixteen-year term.
- 2. <u>Approval</u>: Application of this Rate Schedule shall be subject to the approval of the City Manager or his designee, based on meeting the eligibility criteria outlined herein.
- 3. <u>Agreement</u>: The customer must sign a standard Moreno Valley Economic Development Rate Agreement in order for the rates under this Schedule to be applicable. In addition to the other terms of this Schedule, the Economic Development Rate Agreement shall require the customer to reimburse Moreno Valley for all rate reductions received under this Schedule, if the customer fails to maintain the required minimum load during the applicable term of the Agreement.
- 4. Minimum Load: Customers qualifying under this Schedule as a New Customer with a projected minimum monthly electric demand of at least 500 kW or as an Expanded Load Customer under Applicability Sections 1 and 2 above, respectively, must agree to maintain a minimum level of load for five years for Tiers 1 through 4 and sixteen years for Tier 5 from the date service is first rendered under this Schedule as set forth in the Economic Development Rate Agreement.
- 5. <u>Jobs</u>: Job as prescribed in Section 3c above is defined as Full Time Equivalent that is working at least 1750 hours per year. The Customer retains authority in making individual hiring decisions. This program does not require the Customer to hire any person who does not have the experience and ability to qualify such persons for a job.
- 6. Local Hiring Incentive: The Local Hiring Incentive is available for Tier 1 through Tier 5. Customers who qualify under Tiers 1 4 and voluntarily hire at least 20% of Full Time Equivalent (FTE) employees that are City of Moreno Valley residents will receive an additional discount of 2%; those Customers who hire at least 40% of Full Time Equivalent (FTE) employees that are City of Moreno Valley residents will receive an additional discount of 4%. For Customers eligible for the Tier 5 discount, the Local Hiring Incentive is an additional 1% discount for Customers who voluntarily hire at least 20% of FTE employees that are City of Moreno Valley residents. The additional 1% discount will be applied to the first five years of the sixteen-year term. Any additional discounts will apply to the Energy Charge and Demand Charge. Customers must certify the local hire percentage each year to remain eligible for the additional discount.
- 7. <u>Base Period Usage</u>: Base Period Usage shall be established and agreed to in the Economic Development Rate Agreement for Expanded Load

Customers. Base Period Usage shall be the average monthly energy use and demand for the customer during the last three years of service to the customer, from the date ending the last payment period before the date of the Agreement. Expanded Load qualifying for the rate under this Schedule shall be measured as the difference between the new monthly, meter documented energy use and demand, and the Base Period Usage.

- 8. <u>State Mandated Public Purpose Program Charge</u>: All bills rendered under this Schedule shall be subject to the Public Purpose Program Charge as established by the City Council.
- 9. Miscellaneous Fees and Charges: Rates charged pursuant to this Schedule shall be subject to any Energy Users Taxes, Utility Users Taxes, and any other governmental taxes, duties, or fees which are applicable to Electric Service provided to Customer by the City of Moreno Valley. Rates are also subject to adjustment, as established by the City of Moreno Valley City Council in response to federal or state climate change laws, renewable portfolio standard or other mandated legislation. - 10. Expanded Load: Expanded Load customers applying for this rate must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Utility that the expanded load is new to Moreno Valley.
- 11. Effective Date: The effective date of the Economic Development Rate Agreement shall commence within 12 months from the date of the City's approval, or the Agreement becomes null and void. The Agreement becomes effective upon execution by the parties, and the Economic Development Rate commences upon written notice by customer, and coincides with the customer's normal billing cycle.
- 12. <u>Reapplication</u>: Customers who have received service under the Economic Development Rate are eligible to reapply for the rate as an Expanded Load Customer 12 months after their current Economic Development Rate Agreement has expired, if they meet the criteria therefore.
- 13. <u>Restrictions</u>: Residential customers and federal, state or local government agencies are not eligible to apply for service under this Schedule.
- 14. <u>City Manager</u>: The City Manager or his/her designee may offer to customers an Economic Development Rate and term based upon the actual cost to serve the customer. 1. The Customer must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the City that relocation of its entire operation to a site outside of Moreno Valley Utility's service territory is a viable alternative or that the threat of closure of the Customer's existing facilities is otherwise imminent.

2. The Customer must provide:

- a.An affidavit that "but for" the economic development retention rate incentives, in combination with other city-sponsored incentives, such customer would relocate outside of the City's electric service territory, and
- b. Substantial evidence demonstrating the business has considered viable locations outside of Moreno Valley's service territory including but not limited to incentive offer letters from competing states, local jurisdictions and economic development organizations and/or real estate sale and lease agreements for competing sites, or
- c. Substantial evidence documenting the imminent threat of facility closure, including but not limited to letters from business owners or appropriate corporate officers documenting the circumstances which have led to this imminent threat and why the Business Retention Rate is necessary to retain the business within Moreno Valley Utility's service territory.
- 3. The Customer must agree to maintain a minimum level of load for five years from the date service is first rendered as set forth in the Economic Development Rate Agreement for Business Retention.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of Parcel Map 36465 and Agreement for Public Improvements for the Prologis project located at the northwest corner of Graham Street

ID#2002 Page 1

and Brodiaea Avenue. The City Council approved plot plan PA12-0021 on December 11, 2012 for the construction of an approximately 608,000 square-foot warehouse facility. Subsequent to the plot plan approval, the Community Development Department of the City of Moreno Valley approved Tentative Parcel Map 36465 (PA13-0011) on September 5, 2013. TPM 36465 is a subdivision combining three (3) parcels into one (1) parcel in order to construct the proposed warehouse facility on a single parcel.

DISCUSSION

Prologis USLV TRS CASUB, LLC, the developer of this project, has completed an Agreement for Public Improvements. The developer agrees to perform and complete all of the required public improvements within six (24) months of the date the agreement is executed. The public improvements include, but are not limited to: asphalt concrete, asphalt base, sidewalk, curb & gutter, driveway approaches, street lights, utility trench repairs, striping, sewer, storm drain and street demolition. The public improvements are to be constructed along the west side of Graham Street and north side of Broadiaea Avenue. The City Engineer may execute any future amendments to the agreement, subject to City Attorney approval, if the required public improvements are not completed within said timeframe.

Parcel Map No. 36465 is in substantial conformance with the approved tentative parcel map. The developer has requested that the map be approved for recordation. The Conditions of Approval for this project require that the developer provide surety for the required improvements. Accompanying the agreement is a Faithful Performance bond in the amount of \$712,000 and a Material and Labor bond in the amount of \$356,000 issued by Federal Insurance Company.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff recommends this alternative to allow the project to record the parcel map and construct public improvements.
- Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff does not recommend this alternative as it will not allow the project to record the parcel map and construct public improvements.

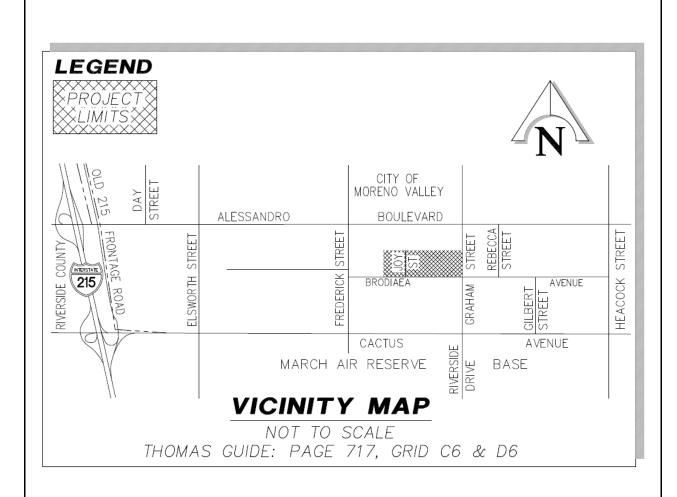

AGREEMENT FOR PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS FOR PROJECT NO. <u>PA13-0011 (PM 36465)</u>

This Agreement made and entered into by and between the City of Moreno Valley, State of California, hereinafter called City, and <u>Prologis USLV TRS CASUB LLC</u>, a <u>Delaware limited liability company</u>, herein after called Developer, on the date the City signs this agreement.

WITNESSETH:

FIRST: Developer, for and in consideration of the approval by the City of the final map of that certain land division, or that certain other land development project, known as PA13-0011 (PM 36435) agrees, at Developer's own expense, to furnish all labor, equipment and material necessary, and within TWENTY-FOUR (24) months from the date this Agreement is executed, to perform and complete in a good and workmanlike manner, all of the required improvements in accordance with those improvement plans for said project which have been approved by the City Engineer, and are on file in the office of the City Engineer, and to do all work incidental thereto in accordance with the standards set forth in City ordinances and regulations, and pay all costs of engineering necessary in connection therewith, which are expressly made a part of this Agreement. All of the above-required work shall be done under the inspection of and to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, and shall not be deemed complete until approved and accepted as complete by the City. Developer further agrees to guarantee the required improvements for a period of one year following acceptance by the City and during this one year period to repair and replace, to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, any defective work or labor done or defective materials furnished. Developer shall complete the improvements described in this paragraph pursuant to Section 66462, Government Code. Developer shall also complete any offsite improvements required as a condition of approval and with plans approved by the City Engineer at such time as the City acquires an interest in the land which will permit the improvements to be made, and the Developer waives the 120 day time limitation set forth in Section 66462.5, Government Code.

Security to guarantee the performance of this agreement shall be in the following amounts:

Faithful Performance security shall be in the sum of <u>SEVEN HUNDRED TWELVE THOUSAND AND NO/100</u> Dollars (***\$712,000.00***). The estimated cost of said work and improvements, pursuant to the Preliminary Estimate of Cost labeled Exhibit A attached hereto.

Labor and Material security shall be in the sum of <u>THREE HUNDRED FIFTY SIX THOUSAND</u>

<u>AND NO/100</u> Dollars (***\$356,00.00****). The estimated cost securing payment of labor and materials is fifty (50) percent of the total cost estimate of the improvements.

Developer further agrees to guarantee the required improvements for a period of one year following acceptance by the City and during this one year period to repair and replace, to the satisfaction of the City Engineer, any defective work or labor done or defective materials furnished. Upon entering the warranty period, the City shall retain ten percent of the original faithful performance security. Developer reserves the right to substitute the form of security, in accordance with the Moreno Valley Municipal Code, at any time during the term of this agreement, subject to approval of the City Engineer and City Attorney.

SECOND: Developer agrees to file with City, prior to the date this Agreement is executed, a good and sufficient improvement security in an amount not less than the estimated cost of the work and improvements for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and good and sufficient security for payment of labor and materials in the amount prescribed by City ordinances and regulations to secure the claims to which reference is made in Title 15 (commencing with Section 3082) of Part 4 of Division 3 of the Civil Code of the State of California. Developer agrees to renew each and every said bond or bonds with good and sufficient sureties or increase the amounts of said bond or bonds, or both, within ten (10) days after being notified by the City Engineer that the sureties or amounts are insufficient. Notwithstanding any other provision herein, if Developer fails to take such action as is necessary to comply with said notice, he shall be in default of this Agreement unless all required

improvements are completed within ninety (90) days of the date on which the City Engineer notified the Developer of the insufficiency of said bonds. Developer reserves the right to substitute the form of security in accordance with the City's Municipal Code at any time during the term of this agreement, subject to approval by the City Engineer and City Attorney.

THIRD: Developer agrees to pay to the City the actual cost of such inspection of the works and improvements as may be required by the City Engineer. Developer further agrees that, if suit is brought upon this Agreement or any bond guaranteeing the completion of the required improvements, all costs and reasonable expenses and fees incurred by the City in successfully enforcing such obligations shall be paid by Developer and guaranteed by the surety in addition to the face amount of the security, including reasonable attorney's fees, and that, upon entry of judgment, such costs, expenses and fees shall be taxed as costs and included in any judgment rendered.

FOURTH: To the furthest extent allowed by law, including California Civil Code Section 2782, Developer shall indemnify, hold harmless and defend City and each of its officers, officials, employees and agents from any and all claims, losses, liabilities, fines, penalties, forfeitures, costs and damages (whether in contract, tort or strict liability, including, but not limited to personal injury, death at any time and/or property damage) incurred by City or any other Person, and from any and all claims, demands and actions in law or equity (including attorney's fees and litigation expenses), arising or alleged to have arisen directly or indirectly out of the performance of this Agreement, including but not limited to the alleged acts or omissions of any contractor, subcontractor, employee or agent acting on behalf of Developer or the design of any improvements to be constructed pursuant to this Agreement or the use of any patent or patented article in the performance of this Agreement.

Developer's obligations to indemnify and hold City harmless shall apply in all instances except those claims caused by the active negligence, sole negligence, or willful misconduct of City or any of its officers, officials, employees or agents. Developer's obligations to defend the City and provide a legal defense (including the retention of attorneys acceptable to City and all legal costs and expenses) shall apply in all instances, except those claims arising out of the sole negligence or the willful misconduct of City or any of its officers, officials, employees or agents.

If Developer retains any contractor or subcontractor to perform any of the Work to be performed under this Agreement, Developer shall require each contractor or subcontractor to indemnify, hold harmless and defend City and each of its officers, officials, employees and agents in accordance with the terms of the preceding paragraphs.

Developer's obligations under his section shall survive the completion of any work to be performed by Developer, the City's inspection and/or acceptance of any work performed by Developer, as well as the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

Developer's provision of insurance, as required below, does not terminate, alter, limit or satisfy Developer's defense and indemnity obligations provided for herein.

FIFTH: Throughout the life of the Agreement, Developer shall pay for and maintain in full force and effect all policies of insurance required hereunder with an insurance company (ies) either (I) admitted by the California Insurance Commissioner to do business in the State of California and rated not less than "A-VII" in Best's Insurance Rating Guide, or (ii) as authorized by the City Manager or his/her designee. The following policies of insurance are required:

(i) COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY insurance which shall be at least as broad as the most current version of Insurance Services Office (ISO) Commercial General Liability Coverage Form CG 00 01 and include insurance for "bodily injury," "property damage" and "personal and advertising injury" with

coverage for premises and operations (including the use of owned and non-owned equipment), products and completed operations, and contractual liability (including, without limitation, indemnity obligations under the Contract) with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage, \$1,000,000 per occurrence for personal and advertising injury, \$2,000,000 aggregate for products and completed operations and \$2,000,000 general aggregate.

- (ii) COMMERCIAL AUTOMOBILE LIABILITY insurance which shall be at least as broad as the most current version of Insurance Services Office (ISO) form CA 00 01 and shall include coverage for "any auto" with limits of liability of not less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily and property damage. Commercial Automobile Liability coverage is required if automobiles are to be operated on city-owned property or within City right-of-way.
- (iii) WORKERS' COMPENSATION insurance as required under the California Labor Code.

Developer shall be responsible for payment of any deductibles or self-insured retentions contained in any insurance policies required hereunder.

All policies of insurance required hereunder shall be endorsed to provide that the coverage shall not be cancelled, non-renewed, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) calendar day written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the City. Upon issuance by the insurer, broker or agent of a notice of cancellation, non-renewal or reduction in coverage or limits, Developer shall furnish City with a new certificate and applicable endorsements for such policy(ies). In the event any policy(ies) is due to expire before the completion of the work, Developer shall provide a new certificate and all applicable endorsements evidencing renewal of such policy(ies) not less than 15 calendar days prior to the expiration date of the expiring policy(ies).

The General Liability and Automobile Liability insurance policies shall be written on an occurrence form and endorsed to name the City and its officers, officials, employees and agents as additional insured's. Such policy(ies) of insurance shall be endorsed so Developer's insurance shall be primary and no contribution shall be required of City. Any Workers' Compensation insurance policy shall contain a waiver of subrogation as to City, its officers, officials, employees and agents. Developer shall furnish City with the certificate(s) and applicable endorsements for all required insurance fourteen (14) days prior to the start of work. NOTE: A Certificate of Insurance is not acceptable. The Certificate of Insurance must be accompanied by the additional insured and primary insurance endorsements.

If Developer retains any contractor or subcontractor to perform any of the Work to be performed under this Agreement, Developer shall require each contractor or subcontractor to provide insurance protection in favor of City, its officers, officials, employees and agents in accordance with the terms of the Agreement. Any contractor or subcontractor performing work on behalf of Developer shall likewise be required to name City its officers, officials, employees and agents as additional insured's as required herein. Developer shall obtain certificates and endorsements from such contractors or subcontractors before the commencement of any work.

At any time during the Agreement, upon request of City, Developer shall immediately furnish City with a complete copy of any insurance policy required under this Agreement, including all endorsements, with said copy certified by the underwriter to be a true and correct copy of the original policy.

If at any time Developer fails to maintain the required insurance in full force and effect, all work permitted thereunder shall be discontinued immediately until notice is received by City that the required insurance has been restored to full force and effect and that the premiums therefore have been paid for a period satisfactory to City. Any failure by Developer to provide or maintain the required insurance shall be considered a material breach of the Agreement.

The fact that insurance is obtained by Developer shall not be deemed to release or diminish its liability, including but not limited to, liability under the indemnity provisions on this Agreement. Developer's duty to defend and indemnify City shall apply to all claims and liabilities, regardless of whether any insurance policies are applicable. The policy limits stated herein do not act as a limitation upon the amount of indemnification required to be provided by Developer.

SIXTH The Developer hereby grants to the City and/or to any authorized agent or employee of the City, the irrevocable permission to enter upon the lands of the above-referenced land division for the purpose of completing the improvements. This permission shall terminate in the event that the Developer has completed the work within the time specified or any extension thereof granted by the City.

SEVENTH: Developer agrees at all times, up to the completion and acceptance of the improvements by the City, to give good and adequate warning to the traveling public of each and every dangerous condition caused by the construction of the improvements, and to protect the traveling public from such defective or dangerous conditions. The Developer shall keep all traveled ways that are a part of, or affected by the construction of this project free and clear of mud, dirt and debris and shall provide twice monthly street sweeping service. A copy of the contract for street sweeping service shall be provided to the City. The Developer's obligation under this provision shall be secured by the bonds securing performance of this Agreement.

EIGHTH: The Developer, his agents and employees, shall give notice to the City Engineer at least 48 hours before beginning any work and shall furnish said City Engineer all reasonable facilities for obtaining full information with respect to the progress and manner of work.

NINTH: If the Developer, or his agents or employees, neglects, refuses, or fails to prosecute the work with such diligence as to insure its completion within the specified time, or within such extensions of time as have been granted by the City, or if the Developer violates, neglects, refuses, or fails to perform satisfactorily any of the provisions of the plans and specifications, he shall be in default of this Agreement and notice in writing of such default shall be served upon him. The City Council shall have the power, on recommendation by the City Engineer, to terminate all rights of the Developer because of such default. The determination by the City Engineer of the question as to whether any of the terms of the Agreement or specifications have been violated, or have not been performed satisfactorily, shall be conclusive upon the Developer, and any and all parties who may have any interest in the Agreement or any portion thereof. The foregoing provisions of this section shall be in addition to all other rights and remedies available to the City under law.

TENTH: It is further agreed by and between the parties hereto, including the surety or sureties on the bonds securing this Agreement that, in the event it is deemed necessary to extend the time of completion of the work contemplated to be done under this Agreement, extensions of time **may** be granted by the City from time to time, either at its own option, or upon request of Developer, and such extensions shall in no way affect the validity of this Agreement or release the surety or sureties on said bonds, Developer further agrees to maintain the aforesaid bonds in full force and effect during the terms of this Agreement, including any extensions of time as may be granted therein.

ELEVENTH: It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto that if any part, term or provision of this Agreement is by the courts held to be unlawful and void, the validity of the remaining portions shall not be affected and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be construed and enforced as if the Agreement did not contain the particular part, term or provision held to be invalid.

TWELFTH: In the event legal action is required to enforce the terms of the Agreement, the prevailing

party shall be entitled to recover attorney's fees and costs, including expert fees.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations:

1. Adopt Resolution No. 2016-20, Establishing New Management Signature Authority for Contracts and other Procurement Transactions thereby updating the City Manager signature authority.

SUMMARY

This report recommends approval of Resolution 2016-20 related to specific management signature authority values established for procurement approval requirements. Signature authorities are subject to change based on best business practices. In 2001 Resolution 2001-13 was adopted establishing management signature authority with a City Manager signature level of \$100,000. In 2008, Resolution 2008-115 updated the signature authority for various management levels. Per City Council direction, this staff report recommends new signature authority levels for the City Manager set at \$75,000 for Public Work Items and \$50,000 for Non-Public Work Items.

DISCUSSION

Management's signature authority limits are utilized to ensure spending authority is limited to various amounts depending on an individual's title. As stated in the City of Moreno Valley Municipal Code, Chapter 3.12, section 3.12.130, "All monetary limits for

signature and award authority shall be as set forth in a resolution of the city council as adopted from time to time". (Ord. 844 § 2, 2012)

In 2008 the best business practice suggested that the management signature levels set in 2001 appear to be relatively low in regards to processing the flow of staff work. The intent of increasing the management signature authority limits in 2008 was to allow management staff to be more efficient in handling the procurement process by aligning the new values closer to their budgetary spending. In 2008 the City Manager signature authority limit of \$100,000 remained the same as the 2001 resolution and signature authority for key management staff was established as follows:

Chief Financial Officer: Up To \$50,000 Directors: Up To \$30,000 Up To \$15,000

At the Council meeting on 03/15/2016 City Council directed staff to adopt a new signature resolution. Resolution 2016-## will lower the City Manager signature limits as follows:

Public Work Items: Up To \$75,000 Non-Public Work Items: Up To \$50,000

Public work items are defined by either the California Labor Code or the California Public Contract Code. Non project contracts will require City Council approval when the annual amount is over the limits as listed above. Approval of items above the limits listed above will require staff to prepare a report for each item and subsequently add the item to a consent calendar for City Council approval.

Approval limits for management staff will be set as follows:

Chief Financial Officer: Up To \$40,000 (Reduced to below the New City Manager authority)

Directors: Up To \$30,000 (unchanged)
Division Managers: Up To \$15,000 (unchanged)

In no case may signature authority exceed specific appropriations in the City's annual budget, as approved by the City Council.

<u>ALTERNATIVES</u>

WHEREAS, in accordance with Chapter 3.12 of Title 3 of the City of Moreno Valley Municipal Code, regarding purchasing, the award of public work contracts of seventy five thousand dollars (\$75,000) or less, for which there are appropriated funds in the City Council approved budget, and the award of non-public works contracts of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) or less, for which there are appropriated funds in the City Council approved budget, may be authorized by the City Manager. The Purchasing and Facilities Division Manager will execute the contract based on the criteria of the chapter. Staff authorized to award contracts may defer to the City Manager or City Council for approval where deemed necessary or otherwise appropriate.

WHEREAS, Public work items are defined by either the California Labor Code or the California Public Contract Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MORENO VALLEY, CALIFORNIA, DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

PARK NAMING POLICY

PURPOSE:

The rapid development of the City of Moreno Valley's park system will afford an exciting opportunity to appropriately name each new park/facility that is constructed within our City. To facilitate this process, the following guidelines have been adopted.

POLICY:

I. Approval of Name:

- A. Public participation in the name selection process will be encouraged.
- B. Proposed names for parks and recreation facilities will be solicited by staff and submitted to the Parks and Recreation Commission for review and approval.
- C. After approval of the Parks and Recreation Commission, the proposed name(s) will be forwarded to the City Council for final review and approval.

II. Criteria for Selection of Names:

- A. The park/facility may be named after a dedicated City street, avenue, or boulevard.
- B. The park/facility may be named after a housing tract that the project is located within.
- C. If the park/facility is located adjacent to a school site, the park may bear the same name as the school.
- D. A park/facility may be named after various significant or historical features that are unique to Moreno Valley, i.e. geographical features, historical events, native birds and/or wildlife, etc.
- E. Although there are many fine individuals both living and deceased who have made significant contributions to the development of the City of Moreno Valley, it shall be the policy of the Parks and Recreation Commission to not consider naming parks in honor of individual persons. Consideration may be given to naming buildings and/or other facilities in honor of individual persons.

- Approve placing the submitted Property Assessment List of delinquent nuisance abatement accounts on the Fiscal Year (FY) 2016/2017 Riverside County property tax roll for collection.
- 4. Direct the City Clerk to file with the Riverside County Assessor's office a certified copy of Resolution No. 2016-21 and the Property Assessment List as required by Section 6.04.120 of the City of Moreno Valley Municipal Code.

SUMMARY

In 2015, the Fire Prevention Bureau performed public nuisance abatements to remove hazardous and other nuisance conditions from vacant parcels in the City. After having been served with a "Notice to Abate" and given a reasonable time for compliance, the property owners failed to voluntarily abate the conditions.

This report recommends that the City Council convene a public hearing to consider staff recommendations to adopt the proposed resolution of the City of Moreno Valley,

confirming assessments on certain real properties and approve placing the submitted Property Assessment List of delinquent nuisance abatement accounts on the Fiscal Year 2016/2017 Riverside County property tax roll for collection.

DISCUSSION

In February of each year, the Fire Prevention Bureau sends each vacant parcel owner as identified by the last equalized assessment roll a Weed and Nuisance Abatement letter. This letter states that all weeds, dry vegetation, rubble, junk, trash, debris, objects, discarded auto bodies, parts and other waste matter upon the premises is a public nuisance and must be abated per Moreno Valley Municipal Code 6.04 by April1.

All vacant parcels in Moreno Valley are inspected on or after April 1 to determine if the property owner voluntarily complied with the Notice to Abate mailed in February. Shortly after inspection, non-compliant property owners receive a Notice of Violation and up to 10 days to comply with the necessary abatement. Following a second inspection, property owners who remain non-compliant receive a second Notice of Violation and 10 additional days to comply with the necessary abatement. Should the vacant parcel still require the removal of all weeds, dry vegetation, rubble, junk, trash, debris, objects, discarded auto bodies, parts and other waste matter, a Final Notice of Violation is mailed to the property owner allowing a final seven days to become compliant before the Fire Prevention Bureau proceeds with the abatement process.

Once the period of time has passed as identified in the final notice, per Municipal Code 6.04, the property is scheduled for abatement by City contractor. This section of the municipal code also allows for recovery of costs associated with said abatements.

The Property Assessment List for general nuisance and weed abatements is hereby submitted for review and consideration by the City Council. A statement of costs was mailed to the legal owner of record for each property requiring abatement action. The County of Riverside equalized tax assessment roll was utilized to determine property ownership. A summary of each abatement is included in the statement of costs, along with the owner's name(s), property description, and the cost for the abatement action. A copy of the statement of costs shall remain on file in the Fire Prevention Bureau.

The Property Assessment List is a current listing of unpaid abatement costs incurred during 2015. Costs approved by the City Council Resolution will result in a special assessment and will become a levy on the FY 2016/2017 tax bill if not paid directly to the City by July 1, 2016. The Notices of Special Assessment will be recorded at the Riverside County Recorder's Office following approval by the City Council.

ALTERNATIVES

1. Approve and authorize the recommended action as presented in this staff report. Staff recommends this alternative as it will facilitate cost recovery for those costs incurred by the City for the abatement of public nuisance and hazard reduction work performed as outlined in the attached Property Assessment List.

 Do not approve and authorize the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff does not recommend this alternative as it will result in the cost for contract abatement work to be absorbed by the City for all costs that remain unpaid by the property owners.

FISCAL IMPACT

Adoption of the resolution would facilitate cost recovery for those costs incurred by the City for public nuisance and hazard reduction work performed as outlined in the Property Assessment List that is attached to the resolution as Exhibit A.

As detailed in the Property Assessment List, the costs incurred by the City for contractual abatements are outlined below. An additional \$13.98 Special Districts Administration (S.D.A.) fixed charge will be added for each parcel at the time the assessment is placed on the County of Riverside Tax Roll for FY 2016/2017.

The Property Assessment List, as approved by City Council, is subject to amendment as necessary to reflect any payments subsequently received from property owners. Costs not paid in full by July 1, 2016, will be processed as special assessments and cost recovery will occur through the payment of taxes. The Statement of Costs and Notices of Special Assessment for each property shall remain on file in the Fire Prevention Bureau. If payment, or partial payment, is received from property owners, that portion of the Exhibit(s) will be revised as appropriate.

NOTIFICATION

Moreno Valley Municipal Code Section 6.04.060 – <u>Notification of Nuisance</u> provides that written notice of nuisance conditions **may** be given to property owners in the following manner:

By regular mail addressed to the owner or person in charge and control of the property; at the address shown on the last available equalized assessment roll of the County of Riverside; or as otherwise known, by posting a "Notice to Abate" on the property where the nuisance condition(s) exists thereby allowing ten days to comply.

Notification of weed abatement conditions was specifically met by:

- 1. Mailing a "Notice to Abate" to property owners by regular mail.
- 2. Mailing a "Notice of Violation" to property owners by regular mail.

3. Telephone contact with property owners, when possible (i.e., phone number on file).

Furthermore, the Fire Prevention Bureau mailed a Statement of Cost to each property owner in March 2016 indicating the amount owed for the nuisance abatement services performed by the City as well as the date of the City Council meeting at which this Public Hearing would occur. An official list of the submitted delinquent accounts was submitted to Special Districts and indicates the maximum charges which can be placed on the property tax roll for FY 2016/2017.

- 2. Approve the recommended projects for inclusion in the Annual Action Plan (FY 2016/17) as an application to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for funding under the federal CDBG, HOME and ESG programs.
- 3. Authorize the Chief Financial Officer to amend the City's Budget to include the allocations as approved in the FY 2016/17 Action Plan.

SUMMARY

Every year, the City is required to submit an Annual Action Plan to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The Annual Action Plan identifies how the CDBG, HOME and ESG Program Funds will be utilized to provide programs and projects that benefit low and moderate-income households and neighborhoods. It also serves as the City's official grant application to HUD which must be submitted by May 13, 2016. The activities recommended under CDBG, HOME and ESG are summarized in Attachment 1. Staff recommends that the City Council conduct a public hearing and approve the proposed project selections for the 2016/17 Annual Action Plan for submittal to HUD.

DISCUSSION

The Annual Action Plan proposed for Council consideration specifically identifies how Moreno Valley will allocate CDBG, HOME and ESG funds for the upcoming year. The 2016/17 Action Plan serves as the fourth annual update to the City's approved five-year Consolidated Plan (2013-2018). Tonight's Public Hearing represents the next to last Public Hearing in a series of meetings conducted under the City's Citizen Participation Plan. The City Council established CDBG funding priorities at the January 19, 2016 meeting. The April 13, 2016 Public Meeting held at the City's Finance Subcommittee Meeting was the first review of the initial funding recommendations made by staff and the CDBG Technical Review Committee. In conformance with HUD requirements, a draft Annual Action Plan was made available for a 30-day public review from April 1, 2016 through April 30, 2016. As of the date of this report, no public comments have been received. The following provides a summary of the events that have occurred or will occur during the application process:

Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - Grant Purpose

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program is authorized by Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended. The primary objective of the CDBG program is to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate income.

The CDBG objective is to be achieved in two ways: First, a grantee can only use funds to assist eligible activities that meet one of three national objectives of the program:

- Benefit low- and moderate-income persons,
- Aid in the prevention or elimination of slums and blight, or
- Meet community development needs having a particular urgency.

Second, at least 70 percent of funds must be spent (over a period of up to 3 years) for activities that address the national objective of benefiting low- and moderate-income persons.

 Expanding the supply of decent and affordable housing, particularly housing for low- and very low-income Americans;

- Strengthening the abilities of State and local governments to design and implement strategies for achieving adequate supplies of decent, affordable housing;
- Providing financial and technical assistance to participating jurisdictions, including the development of model programs for affordable low-income housing;
- Extending and strengthening partnerships among all levels of government and the private sector, including for-profit and non-profit organizations, in the production and operation of affordable housing.

Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) – Grant Purpose

The Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act of 2009 (HEARTH Act) amended the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, revising the Emergency Shelter Grants Program in significant ways and renaming it the Emergency Solutions Grant program. The ESG program is new to the City. The recent switch to use of American Community Survey (ACS) data to calculate HUD allocations made Moreno Valley eligible to receive ESG funds.

The ESG program is issued to assist, protect, and improve living conditions for the homeless. The program provides funding to:

- engage homeless individuals and families living on the street;
- improve the number and quality of emergency shelters for homeless individuals and families;
- help operate these shelters;
- provide essential services to shelter residents,
- rapidly re-house homeless individuals and families, and
- prevent families/individuals from becoming homeless.

I. OVERVIEW

Historically, the City of Moreno Valley (the "City") has received federal funding on an annual basis from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for two formula block grant programs: Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME). Since Program Year 2014/15, the City has become a direct recipient of Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) program funds.

Descriptions of each formula block program (HOME, ESG and CDBG) can be found in Sections II, III, and IV of this report.

The following subsections provide an overview of the Five-Year Consolidated Plan, The Citizen Participation Plan, The One-Year Action Plan and the FY2016-17 Application Process and Review.

The Five-Year Consolidated Plan

Every five years, the City of Moreno Valley prepares a Five-Year Consolidated Plan, which describes community needs, resources, priorities, and proposed activities to be undertaken under certain HUD programs, including CDBG and Home Investment Partnerships (HOME).

The Consolidated Plan for Program Years 2013 through 2018, outline the following goals and strategies:

- Homeless Strategy
- Special Needs Strategy
- Housing Strategy
- Community & Economic Development Strategy

A copy of the City's Consolidated Plan is available for inspection at the Financial & Management Services Department during normal business hours.

The Citizen Participation Plan

The City has developed a Citizen Participation Plan as a part of the Five-Year Consolidated Plan that sets forth the policies and procedures to encourage citizen's participation in the CDBG, HOME and ESG Program planning and implementation processes. This Citizen Participation Plan provides the method and process by which the City will encourage citizen participation in the development of its Consolidated Plan.

A copy of the City's Citizen Participation Plan is available for inspection at the Financial & Management Services Department during normal business hours.

The One-Year Action Plan

Each year in May, the City of Moreno Valley is required to submit an update to the Consolidated Plan to HUD, referred to as an Action Plan. The Action Plan outlines the specific steps that will be taken during the year to address both the community development and housing priorities of the Consolidated Plan. The Action Plan identifies how the CDBG, HOME and ESG Program funds will be utilized to provide programs and projects that benefit low and moderate-income households and neighborhoods.

A copy of the City's One-Year Action Plan for prior program years is available for inspection at the Financial & Management Services Department during normal business hours.

FY2016-17 Application Process and Review

On January 15, 2016, the City published Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for Fiscal Year 2016/2017 Application for Funding for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Home Investment Partnership (HOME) and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG). According to the application guidelines, interested parties were informed to submit their completed applications by February 19, 2016, 4:30 pm. Programs and projects seeking

funding from the City of Moreno Valley must address one or more of the Community Development Priorities set forth in the Five-Year Consolidated Plan, in addition to meeting all other conditions as summarized in the Application booklet. A copy of the application booklet which provides additional information on the City's objectives and policies can be found on the City's website.

The City received thirty-nine (39) applications requesting a total \$4,277,420.

As part of the application process in preparation of the One-Year Action Plan, the City has contracted Willdan Financial Services ("Willdan") to collaborate with City Staff as the Technical Review Committee for the CDBG, HOME, and ESG application proposals. On February 29, 2016, the City held an "Open Technical Review Meeting" to provide applicants an opportunity to explain their programs in person and for the Technical Review Committee and Finance Subcommittee members to ask applicants questions directly. The information provided in the completed application packet and during the Open Technical Review Meeting was considered to evaluate and score each applicant in accordance with the evaluation guidelines described in the application booklet.

On March 8, 2016, the Technical Review Committee reviewed the preliminary results and City staff provided input regarding return applicant's prior performance in terms of meeting their established goals, expenditure and administrative requirements. The Technical Review Committee's preliminary recommendations were presented at a Public Meeting held on April 13, 2016 during the City's Finance Subcommittee. The following subsequent sections of this report contain the current proposed project selections for Fiscal Year 2016/2017.

In line with the City's policies and objectives, the final project selections will be made by the City Council via Public Hearing and according to the Citizen's Participation Plan. The specific funding allocations will be compiled into the Annual Action Plan which must be submitted to HUD 45 days before the beginning of the program year. Following HUD's approval, the program year begins on July 1 and ends on June 30 of the following year.



II. Home Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) - \$527,298

Grant Purpose

The Home Investment Partnerships Program was established by the Title II of the Cranston-Gonzalez National Affordable Housing Act. The objectives of the HOME Program include:

- expanding the supply of decent and affordable housing, particularly housing for low- and very low-income Americans;
- strengthening the abilities of State and local governments to design and implement strategies for achieving adequate supplies of decent, affordable housing;
- providing financial and technical assistance to participating jurisdictions, including the development of model programs for affordable low-income housing; and
- extending and strengthening partnerships among all levels of government and the private sector, including for-profit and non-profit organizations, in the production and operation of affordable housing.

III. Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) - \$181,852

Grant Purpose

The Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing Act of 2009 (HEARTH Act) amended the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, revising the Emergency Shelter Grants Program in significant ways and renaming it the Emergency Solutions Grants program. The ESG program is new to the City. The recent switch to use of American Community Survey (ACS) data to calculate HUD allocations made Moreno Valley eligible to receive ESG funds.

IV. Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) - \$1,932,762

Grant Purpose

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program is authorized by Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended. The primary objective of the CDBG program is to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing, a suitable living environment, and expanded economic opportunities, principally for persons of low and moderate income.

The CDBG objective is to be achieved in two ways:

First, a grantee can only use funds to assist eligible activities that meet one of three national objectives of the program:

- benefit low- and moderate-income persons,
- aid in the prevention or elimination of slums and blight, or
- meet community development needs having a particular urgency.

Second, at least 70 percent of funds must be spent (over a period of up to 3 years) for activities that address the national objective of benefiting low- and moderate-income persons.

According to the CDBG regulations, the amount of CDBG funds obligated within a program year to support public service activities may not exceed 15% of the annual program allocation. As a result, the City's Public Service projects for program year 16-17 is limited to \$289,914.30

There were a total of \$1,030,272 public service applications received, exceeding the cap by \$740,357.70. Priority was provided to returning applicants with good performance within the respective public service category.

After taking into account the limitations for CDBG Administration and Public Service Activities, the remaining allocation available to fund other activities was \$1,256,295.30. There was a total of \$2,403,422 for applications received for other activities, exceeding the Fiscal Year 2016/17 allocation by \$1,147,126.70. The City anticipates that approximately \$135,000 of prior-year uncommitted funds will be available and can be utilized to decrease the funding deficit for these type of activities.

For 35 years, VFC's CASA program in San Diego County has provided tens of thousands of individual foster children, newborns to 21-year-olds, with volunteer CASAs who advocate for their best interests. Riverside County also had a smaller CASA program that once served Moreno Valley foster children; however, due to management problems cited by the Judicial Council of California and the Riverside Superior Court, the nonprofit organization CASA for Riverside County, Inc., lost its authorization to provide court advocacy on August 31, 2014. The Riverside Superior Court asked Voices for Children, because of its exemplary professional reputation and acumen, to step forward and help rebuild CASA services in Riverside County. Voices for Children became contracted with the Judicial Council to provide a CASA program for Riverside County and began rebuilding and operating this program in February 2015. The Riverside County CASA initiative involves recruiting, training, and managing volunteer CASAs and this vital program will serve approximately 300 vulnerable foster children in crisis during 2016-2017.

A \$15,000 Community Development Block Grant from the City of Moreno Valley would provide a CASA to six foster children in the City of Moreno Valley for a full year, and case assessment to an additional 24 children. In quantifiable terms, 30 foster children in Moreno Valley will benefit; to serve them, we will recruit, train, and closely manage and supervise four to five CASAs (advocating for the six foster children for an entire year), and VFC Advocacy Supervisors will provide case assessment. We have recently expanded our professional staff in Riverside County to include a new Advocacy/Training Supervisor as well as a Program Manager. We now have four professional staff in Riverside County who will provide the critical staffing support; this CDBG grant would partially fund salaries for these staff members to provide direct program services to foster children based in Moreno Valley.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations: That the City Council:

- 1. Conduct a public hearing and accept public testimony on abatements of code enforcement related public nuisances.
- Adopt Resolution No. 2016-22. A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley, California, Confirming Statements of Costs Against Real Property Located in the City of Moreno Valley, for Abatements of Code Enforcement Related Public Nuisances and Direction that Said Statement of Costs Constitute a Lien Upon Said Properties.

SUMMARY

Pursuant to the provisions of the City of Moreno Valley Municipal Code Chapter 6.04, in order to protect and preserve the health, safety, and general welfare of the public, the City Manager or designee directs the abatement of various public nuisances and the recovery of costs associated with said abatements. Cost recovery may be achieved by recording a Notice of Special Assessment with the County Recorder's Office.

DISCUSSION

The Code and Neighborhood Services Division performed public nuisance abatements during 2015. These abatements were to remove hazardous and other nuisance conditions from properties. After having been served with a "Notice to Abate" and given a reasonable time for compliance, the property owners failed to voluntarily abate the conditions.

In some cases, pursuant to Section 6.04.140, <u>Emergency Abatement</u> emergency conditions have been abated without adhering to the provisions referenced in the abatement notification procedures. Such emergencies may include the pumping and securing of accessible pools with stagnant water, securing open and accessible buildings, abating extreme fire hazard conditions, and other similar nuisance conditions that constitute an immediate danger to life or property.

Property owners were served with a Statement of Costs and billed, requesting payment for all costs associated with the City-performed abatement action, by regular mail. Staff is requesting that the City Council authorize the placement of unpaid abatement costs as a special assessment (tax lien) against the properties.

The Property Assessment List for general nuisance abatements is hereby submitted for review and consideration by the City Council. Code and Neighborhood Services staff initiated and completed abatement action of general public nuisances in various locations within the City.

The County of Riverside equalized tax assessment roll was utilized to determine property ownership. A summary of the abatement is included in each statement of cost letter, along with the owner's name(s), property description, and the itemized list of charges for the abatement action. Statement of Costs were mailed to the legal owner of record for each property requiring abatement action and a copy of the letter will remain on file in the Community Development Department.

The Property Assessment List is a current listing of unpaid abatement costs incurred during 2015. Costs approved by the City Council Resolution will result in a special assessment and will become a levy on the FY 2016/2017 tax bill if not paid directly to the City by July 1, 2016. The Notices of Special Assessment will be recorded at the Riverside County Recorder's Office following approval by the City Council.

ALTERNATIVES

- Conduct a public hearing and approve the Resolution for the Abatement of Public Nuisances to recover the costs expended to abate nuisance conditions. This alternative is recommended by staff.
- 2. Do not approve the resolution resulting in costs for contract abatement work being absorbed by the City for all costs that remain unpaid by the property owners. This alternative is not recommended by staff.

FISCAL IMPACT

Adoption of the resolution would facilitate cost recovery for those costs incurred by the City for public nuisance work performed as outlined in the attached Property Assessment List. As detailed in Exhibit A, the costs incurred by the City for contractual abatements are outlined below. An additional \$13.98 Special Districts Administration

(SDA) fixed charge will be added for each parcel at the time the assessment is placed on the County of Riverside Tax Roll for FY 2016/2017.

The Property Assessment List, as approved by City Council, is subject to amendment as necessary to reflect any payments subsequently received from property owners. Costs not paid in full by July 1, 2016, will be processed as special assessments and cost recovery will occur through the payment of taxes. The Statement of Costs and Notices of Code Violation Non-Compliance for each property shall remain on file in the Community Development Department. If payment, or partial payment, is received from property owners, that portion of the Exhibit(s) will be revised as appropriate.

NOTIFICATION

Moreno Valley Municipal Code Section 6.04.060 – <u>Notification of Nuisance</u> provides that written notice of nuisance conditions may be given to property owners in the following manner:

By regular mail addressed to the owner or person in charge and control of the property; at the address shown on the last available equalized assessment roll of the County of Riverside; or as otherwise known, by posting a "Notice to Abate" on the property where the nuisance condition(s) exists thereby allowing ten days to comply.

Notification of these public nuisance conditions was specifically met by:

- 1. Posting the property with a "Notice to Abate".
- 2. Mailing a "Notice to Abate" by certified and/or regular mail to the property owner.
- 3. Telephone contact with the property owner and/or mortgage company (in the case of vacant properties), when possible.

6.04.010 Purpose.

This chapter is adopted to declare what constitutes a public nuisance and to establish procedures to abate nuisances and to recover costs of such abatement. It is declared to be in the public interest to promote the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the city by providing a summary procedure for the abatement of nuisances, which abatement procedures shall be in addition to all other proceedings by this code or otherwise by law. (Ord. 772 § 2, 2008)

6.04.020 Definitions.

Unless specifically defined in this section, words and phrases used in this chapter shall be interpreted to give them the meaning in common usage and to give this chapter its most reasonable application.

"Abandoned" (vehicle) means any vehicle which has been left on private property or public property in such inoperable or neglected condition that the owner's intention to relinquish all further rights or interests in may be reasonably concluded.

"Abandoned" (building, structure or property) means any property that is vacant and under a current notice of default, notice of trustee's sale or that has been the subject of a foreclosure sale where the title was retained by the beneficiary of a deed of trust involved in the foreclosure, or that is transferred under a deed in lieu of foreclosure or sale.

"Abatement" means the demolition, removal, repair, maintenance, construction, reconstruction, replacement or reconditioning of structures, appliances or equipment; or the removal, transportation, disposal and treatment of waste and abandoned materials and equipment capable of harboring, breeding, or attracting rodents or insects or producing odors or blight.

"Attractive nuisance" means any condition, instrumentality or machine which is unsafe and unprotected and thereby dangerous to young children by reason of their inability to appreciate the peril which exists, and which may reasonably be expected to attract young children to the premises and risk injury by playing with, in, or on it. Attractive nuisances may include, but shall not be limited to: (1) abandoned and/or broken equipment; (2) hazardous pools, ponds, culverts, excavations; and (3) neglected machinery.

"Building" means any structure, including, but not limited to, any house, garage, duplex, apartment, condominium, stock cooperative, mobilehome, or other residential, commercial

- Hold a public hearing and adopt Resolution No. 2016-19. A Resolution of the City Council of the City of Moreno Valley, California, Ordering the Vacation of Joy Street North of Brodiaea Avenue.
- 2. Direct the City Clerk to certify said resolution and transmit a copy of the resolution to the County Recorder's office for recording.

SUMMARY

This report recommends adoption of the proposed resolution for the full vacation of Joy Street north of Brodiaea Avenue. The project conditions of approval for the plot plan (PA12-0021) and Tentative Parcel Map 36465 (PA13-0011) require the vacation of Joy Street prior to the construction of a proposed warehouse facility. The project site is located at the northwest corner of Graham Street and Brodiaea Avenue.

DISCUSSION

The City Council approved plot plan PA12-0021 on December 11, 2012 for the construction of an approximately 608,000 square-foot warehouse facility. Subsequent to the plot plan approval, the Community Development Department of the City of Moreno Valley approved Tentative Parcel Map 36465 (PA13-0011) on September 5,

2013. TPM 36465 is a subdivision combining three (3) parcels into one (1) parcel in order to construct the proposed warehouse facility on a single parcel.

In addition, the vacation of Joy Street falls within the scope of the Environmental Impact Report certified for Plot Plan PA12-0021 by the City Council on December 11, 2012, therefore, no new or additional environmental review or determination is required.

As a requirement of the state Government Code and Streets & Highways Code, a full vacation must be found to be in conformity with the General Plan by the local planning agency. The Planning Commission reviewed the proposed full vacation of Joy Street at its January 28, 2016 meeting and found that vacating Joy Street was in conformity with the General Plan and Zoning Regulations. City staff requires that the vacation be completed prior to issuance of building permits in accordance with the project conditions of approval.

The proposed warehouse facility will be constructed over Joy Street and the full vacation of this roadway is necessary to allow for the construction of the building and onsite improvements. At present, the portion of Joy Street to be vacated is fully improved. Public utility notice letters were sent to all utility companies that may exist within the portion of the street to be vacated. There is currently an existing sewer main within Joy Street which will be abandoned upon the completion of a new alternate system along the northerly project boundary. There is also an existing storm drain within the private parcel which will be abandoned upon the completion of a new alternate storm drain system routed along the westerly project boundary. The developer is coordinating with the Eastern Municipal Water District (EMWD) and the Riverside County Flood Control & Water Conservration District staff for the relocation of their respective facilities.

As a result of the utility notice letters, the Southern California Gas Company and EMWD requested that public utility easements be reserved within Joy Street until such time that their respective facilities are abandoned and/or relocated. These facilities will be removed with the other public improvements within this section of roadway per the conditions of approval.

Therefore, in accordance with the Streets & Highway Code, staff is recommending the vacation of Joy Street as described and shown in the exhibits attached to the proposed resolution for the following reasons: 1) the vacation would not cut off access to any adjacent properties 2) the street will be impassable to vehicular traffic following the construction of the proposed building and 3) the right-of-way will be considered excess right-of-way and not required for street purposes once all public facilities are abandoned and/or relocated.

ALTERNATIVES

1. Approve and adopt the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff recommends this alternative because Joy Street is no longer, nor in the future will be, useful for road and public utility easement purposes. This will allow for the construction of the proposed project as approved by the City.

2. Do not approve and adopt the recommended actions as presented in this staff report. Staff does not recommend this alternative because Joy Street would remain and this would not allow for the construction of the proposed project as approved by the City.

FISCAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact.

<u>NOTIFICATION</u>

Written notice of the intent to vacate Joy Street has been provided to the various utility companies, in addition to those businesses within 300-feet of the project boundaries. The public has been notified by publication in the newspaper, the posting of a large – scale notice on the project site and through the agenda.

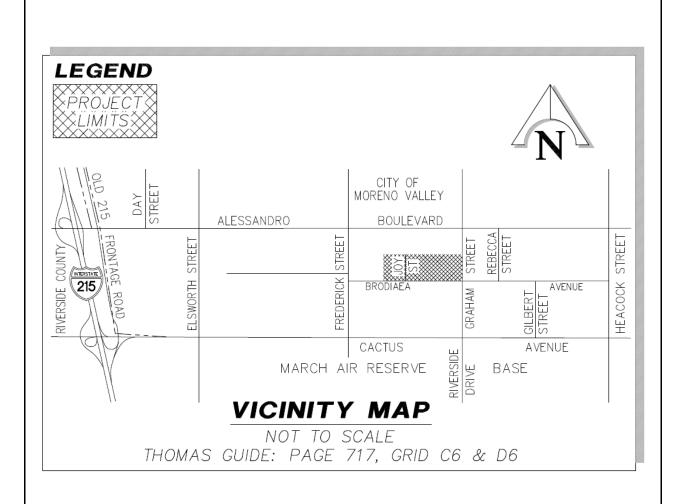

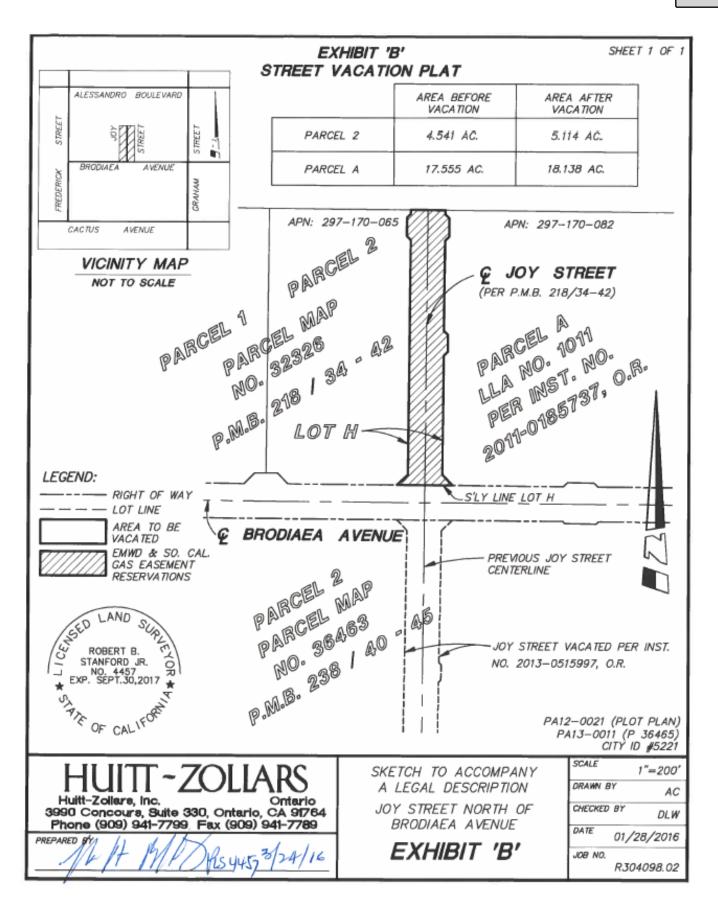

Sophisticated Water Quality Monitoring

The Box Springs Mutual Water Company performs weekly bacteriological and physical samplings. These samplings are compared to more than 175 state and federal standards providing data on the condition of the water supply's purity and aesthetics. The United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and State Water Resources Control Board the agencies responsible for establishing drinking water quality standards, including prescribing the regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems.

Why is There Anything in My Water?

Sources of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water due to these activities include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agriculture, livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, that can be naturallyoccurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals that are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, agricultural application and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and the State Water Resources Control Board prescribe regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. Department regulations also establish limits for contaminants in bottled water that provide the same protection for public health.

How Your Water Is Treated

More than 75% of Box Springs water is supplied by a local well with the balance being delivered from Metropolitan Water District's Henry J. Mills Water Treatment Plant on Alessandro Boulevard.

The natural filtered well water only requires a small amount of liquid chlorine to meet disinfection standards. Water from the Mills Treatment Plant goes through complex treatment process and is disinfected with chloramine. Chloramines are a combination of chlorines and ammonia. Under rare or unusual operational situation, there may be a possibility for chloramine to be delivered to Box Springs hence the special warning below.

Special Exceptions (Kidney Dialysis/Aquariums)

Customers who have unique water quality needs and who use specialized home treatments, such as kidney dialysis machines, should make the necessary adjustments to remove chloramines. Like chlorine, chloramines are toxic to dialysis water. Customers who have fish tanks in their homes or businesses should also take precautions to remove chloramines prior to adding water to tanks. Effective treatments include using granular-activated carbon filters or using chemicals specifically designed to remove chloramines. Allowing drinking water to stand, boiling water, and chemicals to remove chlorine will NOT remove chloramines.

Special Health Information

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons, such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants, can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA and Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available on the EPA Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1.800.426.4791).

Cryptosporidium is a microbial pathogen found in surface water throughout the U.S. Although filtration removes cryptosporidium, the most commonly used filtration methods cannot guarantee 100 percent removal. Ingestion of cryptosporidium may cause cryptosporidiosis, an abdominal infection. Symptoms of infection include nausea, diarrhea and abdominal cramps. Most healthy individuals can overcome the disease within a few weeks. However, immuno-compromised people are at greater risk of developing life-threatening illness. We encourage immuno-compromised individuals to consult their doctor regarding appropriate precautions to take to avoid infection. Cryptosporidium must be ingested to cause disease, and it may spread through means other than drinking water.

Nitrate in drinking water at levels above 45 mg/L is a health risk for infants of less than six months of age. Such nitrate levels in drinking water can interfere with the capacity of the infant's blood to carry oxygen, resulting in a serious illness; symptoms include shortness of breath and blueness of skin. Nitrate levels above 45 mg/L may also affect the ability of the blood to carry oxygen in other individuals, such as pregnant women and those with certain specific enzyme deficiencies. If you are caring for an infant or you are pregnant, you should ask advice from your health care provider.

Lead. If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Box Springs Mutual Water Company is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your

Drinking Water Fluoridation

The Metropolitan Water District began fluoridating their drinking water supplies in November 2007; Metropolitan supplies the majority of Western's imported water source, which Box Springs Mutual Water Company, in turn supplies to you. Water delivered by Box Springs to our customers will remain below the regulated dosage of 2 parts per million (ppm) with an optimal level of 0.8 ppm. This follows the recommendations of the California Department of Public Health, the U.S. Centers of Disease Control and Prevention, and the American Dental Association. Fluoride levels in drinking water are limited under California state regulations at a maximum dosage of 2 parts per million (ppm). Groundwater is blended with the imported Metropolitan water source. Because of the blending, your water will normally be in the 0.5 ppm range, below the optimal level.

Drinking fluoridated water on a regular basis makes the use of fluoride tablets or drops unnecessary. However, the continued use of fluoride treatments by professional dental caregivers is recommended. Customers who do not wish to drink fluoridated water should know that most bottled waters contain levels of fluoride below the optimum range. Home water treatment units that use reverse osmosis membrane filtration will effectively remove fluoride. However, activated carbon filters will not. As always, customers should check for state certification for fluoride removal on any home water treatment unit being considered.

Source Water Assessment

A Source Water Assessment lists possible contaminants that might affect the quality of your water sources. In December 2002, the Metropolitan Water District completed its source water assessment of its State Water Project supply. State Water Project supplies are considered to be most vulnerable to urban/storm water runoff, wildlife, agriculture, recreation and wastewater. An assessment of the groundwater well for the water system was completed in April 2002. The well is considered most vulnerable to the following activity associated with contaminants detected in the water supply: historical animal feeding operations. The sources are most vulnerable to the following activity not associated with any detected contaminants: gas stations. The Source of Your Water Supply

More than 75% of your water supply is pumped groundwater. You'll see this listed as Well #17 on the Water Quality Table. About 25% of your water is supplied by Western Municipal Water District. Western purchases its water supplies from the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California. The water Western supplies comes from Northern California via the California Aqueduct and its treated at Metropolitan's Henry J. Mills Water Treatment Plant in Riverside. The two waters are blended to reduce the higher nitrate content of the well water to a State Water Resources Control Board approved level.

SHARING PROPOSAL

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendation:

That the City Council consider the School District's tentative proposal and provide direction to the City Manager and City Attorney on how to proceed.

SUMMARY

In September 2015, the City Council voted to gradually phase out the City's funding of the School Crossing Guard Program over a period of time, that would take effect upon the subsequent approval of a mid-year budget adjustment that would make "official" the phased out funding plan. However, instead of approving the budget adjustment, the City Council authorized former Mayor Jesse Molina and Interim City Attorney Steven Quintanilla to meet with representatives of the Moreno Valley Unified School District ("School District") to discuss the School Crossing Guard issue to determine whether there are alternatives for the City Council and the School District Board of Trustees to consider in lieu of a City-funding phase out plan.

In light of the foregoing, Messrs. Molina and Quintanilla met with representatives of the School District, which included former Board President Gary Baugh, Superintendent Dr. Judith White and School District Legal Counsel Chris Keeler. (New Board President Jesus Holguin replaced Mr. Baugh for the last meetings between the parties.) In addition, for technical assistance, the City had Traffic Manager Eric Lewis and the School District had Facilities Manager Sergio ** attend some of the meetings.

It is important to note that both parties were very clear from the start that the primary objective was and should always be the safety of the school children.

DISCUSSION

At the conclusion of the meetings between the parties, a consensus was reached that the School District would offer to pay for half of the annual cost of the School Crossing Guard Program subject to the terms and conditions described below. The School District plans to memorialize its proposal in the form of a draft agreement which will be formally presented to the City Council (at a subsequent meeting) and the School District Board of Trustees for their formal consideration. (For the record, it is important to note that the City's representatives made it clear to the School District that it had no authority to bind the City Council to any proposed change in the funding of the School Crossing Guard Program.)

PROPOSAL

The School District's offer to pay for one-half of the annual cost of the School Crossing Guard Program is subject to the following terms and conditions:

- 1. Eliminate Mid-Day Crossing Guard Shifts
 - a. Commencing 2016-2017 School Year
 - b. Joint District/City Notice will be provided to parents of incoming students.
- 2. Eliminate 5 of the 8 Unwarranted Crossing Guard Locations
 - a. Commencing 2016-2017 School Year
 - b. Joint District/City Notice will be provided to parents
- 3. Maintain 3 of the 8 Unwarranted Crossing Guard Locations
 - a. Jointly consider need for additional Traffic Control Devices for these 3 Unwarranted Locations Monitor to consider whether there is still a need to maintain Crossing Guards at these locations for 2017-2018 School Year
- 4. The School District and the City will commit to having their staffs coordinate on grants and legislative advocacy efforts to seek additional financial assistance from the State and other sources.

The School District representatives also questioned the cost of using City employees as School Crossing Guards and strongly suggested that the City consider contracting out the services for the purpose of reducing the cost of the program, which is a critical component of the School District's anticipated offer.

Finally, there was also discussion about the term of the anticipated cost sharing program. The School District representatives purported that a three year agreement would be preferable by the School District, but the City's representatives suggested a one year pilot program which would give both parties a reasonable opportunity to observe how the restructured program is working. For instance, (a) it may turn out that maintaining crossing guards at the unwarranted crossing guard locations are not necessary; (b) there may be changed circumstances in traffic that may require additional crossing guards; (c) there may be alternative sources of funding; etc.

ALTERNATIVES

That the City Council consider the School District's tentative proposal and provide direction to the City Manager and City Attorney on how to proceed.

FISCAL IMPACT

The FY 2016/17 budget cost savings associated with the elimination of the unwarranted intersections, contracting for services, and the 50% cost sharing with the School District, is estimated to be \$380,000. The program is currently funded through gas tax revenues.

TITLE: AMENDMENT TO COUNCIL RULES AND PROCEDURES

CHANGING ORDER OF BUSINESS

RECOMMENDED ACTION

Recommendations: That the City Council:

1. Review and discuss options for altering the Order of Business at council meetings, provide staff direction and take whatever action the Council deems appropriate.

SUMMARY

This report recommends adoption of a Resolution amending Section 1.1.2.1 to the Rules of Procedure for City Council Meetings. The proposed amendment would move the placement on the agenda of council comments from the end of the meeting to the beginning.

DISCUSSION

Under the current City Council Rules of Procedure, the Council is provided a period of closing comments. This period has historically been used by councilmembers to share upcoming community events or relate personal experiences regarding past events with the public. At the April 5, 2016 regular council meeting, Councilmember Jempson asked if the Council would consider the option of moving this comment period up to the beginning of the meeting so that more people could hear the information being shared. Councilmember Price provided a second to place the matter on the agenda.

Attached to this report is a proposed Resolution which would amend the City Council Rules of Procedure in the following manner:
