


Emergency Operations Center

- **Support Center for City:**

What's a Truck?

- A 'Truck' is an extra-large tool-box
- It has a 100' extension ladder
- 3k GPM pointed down on the fire
- It does not have water or a pump
- Trucks are VERY expensive (2 mil.)

Truck 2 ladder = 100 ft.

SOLARIS PAPER

Engine ladders = 24 ft.

What's an Engine?

- A 'Fire Engine' carries people, water, a pump, hose, ladders and EMS / Rescue equipment.
- 500 gallons of water
- Most versatile piece of equipment in the fleet.
- Number of engines needed is based on our values at risk.





2000 sq. ft. house / 3= 600+ GPM.

Engine nozzles can produce 250 GPM.


3 hose-lines are required to put out this house fire

PPS.3-1: Provide responsive, efficient, and effective police services that promotes a high level of public safety.

PPS.3-7: Continue to engage the Police and Fire Departments in the development review process to ensure that projects are designed and operated in a manner that minimizes the potential for criminal activity and fire hazards and maximizes the potential for responsive police and fire services.
